U.S. Supreme Court Upholds Indian Child Welfare Act in Adoptive Couple v. Baby Girl

June 25, 2013 Reno, NV - In today's 5-4 decision in *Adoptive Couple v. Baby Girl* the United States Supreme Court upheld the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA), but reversed and remanded this case back to the South Carolina courts on a technicality. The narrow decision focused on the standard to determine whether this particular father's parental rights could be terminated.

Background: In mid-April of 2013, the Supreme Court Justices considered an appeal by the South Carolina couple and their lawyers to the South Carolina Supreme Court decision which held the following:

1. that it was in Veronica's best interests to be placed with her father;
2. that ICWA applied and was not unconstitutional;
3. the "Existing Indian Family" doctrine was inapplicable as an exception to the application of the ICWA in this case;

4. that the father did not voluntarily consent to the termination of his parental rights or the adoption;

5. the Appellants failed to prove by clear and convincing evidence that Father's parental rights should be terminated or that granting custody of Baby Girl to Father would likely result in serious emotional or physical damage to Baby Girl.

U.S. Solicitor General Donald Verrilli and 19 states and state attorneys general were joined by a large array of groups who submitted 24 separate briefs in all. Not one state submitted briefs in support of Adoptive Couple. The overwhelming support included 17 former and current members of Congress; Casey Family Programs, the Children's Defense Fund, 16 other child welfare organizations; the American Civil Liberties Union; broad coalitions of psychology associations, child advocates, legal experts; adult Native American adoptees; and tribal amicus briefs from 333 American Indian tribes.

Two national tribal amicus briefs were submitted. The first, focused on the legislative history and importance of ICWA, was submitted by the Association on American Indian Affairs, NCAI, and the National Indian Child Welfare Association (NICWA), who were joined by 30 Indian tribes and five Indian organizations. A second national tribal amicus brief addresses the constitutional issues raised by the petitioners and also includes 24 tribal nations and organizations. The members of the Tribal Supreme Court Project-Native American Rights Fund (NARF) and NCAI-in partnership with NICWA, joined together to organize the briefs in support of the father.

After such good news, a few weeks later Indian Country learned that the South Carolina Supreme Court order directed the South Carolina Family Court to order the transfer of Baby Girl Veronica's custody to the Adoptive Couple.

On July 18, 2013 NCAI issued

Long time Shawnee resident Norma Jean Scott, 80, passed away July 21, 2013, in Oklahoma City surrounded by her family. She was born on December 2, 1932 in Pawnee, OK, to William and Bessie (Hale) Scott. Norma was an enrolled member of the Sac and Fox of the Mississippi in Iowa/Meskwaki Nation in Tama, Iowa, and was also a descendent of the Kickapoo Tribe of Oklahoma.

Her earlier years were spent in the Harrah and McLoud area and she graduated from McLoud High School in 1950. She played guard on the high school basketball team. Norma joined the U.S. Marines in 1952, served for a short time, and achieved the rank of Private First Class before her Honorable Discharge. Norma was retired and had worked at many various occupations over the years. The two she was most proud of was as a Teacher's Assistant at the Kickapoo Head Start for many years and as a cook for the Citizen Potawatomi Nation Elders program.

Norma was a mother/grandmother/aunt/friend to many and to anyone who needed someone to love them. Her heart and home were always open to those in need. She didn't have much but was always willing to share. In her younger years, Norma was often called upon to cook for many different tribal ceremonies; her fry bread is legendary! She enjoyed many things and lived a good, long life. Norma loved her "Bold and Beautiful" soap opera, collecting butterfly or cow keepsakes, reading, going to pow-wows, casino-hopping, and was an avid "Thunder" basketball fan. She also enjoyed KTO Elder Activities when able to participate and loved being with her family.

She was preceded in death by her parents; brothers Henry Scott and James Scott; sisters Ernestine Green, Dolores Morton, and Ruth Logan; one son Steven Kaskaske; and numerous other relatives.

Norma Jean is survived by three sons: Tommy Kaskaske, Randy Chakenatho, and Mike Scott; four daughters: Gail Keel, Corene Scott, Ruth Scott, and Jessica Keahnah; 15 grandchildren; 13 great-grandchildren (and one on the way); members of her tribally adopted families: Esther Norydyke, Irene Frye, Wanda Murdock, Caroline Kishketon, and Jesse Tofpi; her best friend, Joe Fish, and family; numerous cousins, nieces, nephews, and countless friends. All of whom she loved dearly. Norma stated many times her greatest achievement was her family.

A wake service was held at Kickapoo Friends Center, McLoud, on Tuesday, July 23, with the Revered Tommy Labeff officiating. A traditional meal was served at the church. Funeral services were Wednesday, July 24 with Reverends Brad Wood and Victor White officiating. A noon meal followed the service. Burial was at the Kickapoo Friends Center.

to order the transfer of Baby Girl Veronica's custody to the Adoptive Couple.

On July 18, 2013 NCAI issued a statement on the ruling.

"We are witnessing the final steps in a forced removal of a Native child from her father, her family, and her Native community.

"NCAI is astounded and alarmed that the South Carolina Supreme Court has issued an order to transfer Veronica, the daughter of Dusten Brown, a citizen of the Cherokee Nation, to the adoptive couple and doing so without holding a hearing to determine the best interests of the child. There is no scenario in which the best interests of this three year old

child will be served by removing her from her loving father and family raising her in Oklahoma. Mr. Brown pursued his right to care for his biological daughter since the moment he learned of the adoption. A removal of the child will be extremely traumatic for her and is clearly not in her best interest."

I thank you once again for the privilege and honor to serve you as Chief of our Blessed Nation, ask that you thank Him for the Love and Mercy that He has bestowed on our Sac & Fox Nation, and to continue praying for the leadership of our People.

"food" and plenty of it.



Mission Statement

The Absentee Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma's Domestic Violence mission is to eliminate violence in Native Country and to strengthen Native families to end the cycle of violence. Absentee Shawnee Tribe Domestic Violence program serves Native American families and Non-Native families by providing advocacy in the areas of Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, and Dating Violence.



The Domestic Violence Department provides services to:

Victims of Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault (on call 24 hours per day), Stalking, and/or Dating Violence. We serve Native and non-Native victims as well as their children, as these problems affect everyone in our community. When a victim flees the situation they often leave behind all of their belongings, that's where we step in, offering a hand up to the victim. We offer advocacy for the victim, through the process of court, counseling, housing and utility assistance, referrals as needed (for services ASTDV does not provide), shelter, and transitional housing. We have four transitional houses fully furnished, where victims will be provided the opportunity to get an education and obtain job skills. Emergency transportation can be provided as well. Office of Environmental Services Makes Testing Your Water Well Possible

For the past few years SFNOES has been providing rural water well testing for Sac and Fox Nation tribal members as part of the EPA funded Clean Water Act grant program. The name for this specific program under the CWA grant is called the Drinking Water Baseline Assessment. SFNOES will begin sampling in late June/early July and is looking for more participants. In some instances, testing is the only way to become aware of contaminants in your drinking water. If your drinking water does not come from a public water system, *you alone are responsible for assuring that your water is safe to drink.* The assessment includes testing for chemical, physiological, and bacteriological parameters. Please

understand that this is a great program, but Sac and Fox Nation does not have the authority to regulate private wells and is not responsible for, nor capable of, remediating wells containing high levels of contaminants. Should any participant's well water exceed safe drinking water standards, SFNOES will contact and work with the appropriate agency to assist you. Testing funds are limited, so if you are interested please fill out and mail the application in this month's newsletter to OES or contact OES by phone or email and provide the information requested on the application. I would also like to thank all of the people that have showed interest in the program and that have signed up to participate this Summer.



Sac and Fox Nation Police Department Safety Tips from Tribal Police Chief, Bob Roberts

Summer Safety Tips from Sac and Fox Tribal Police Chief Bobby Roberts.

Summer means lots of kids will be playing outdoors, but it's important to keep a safety checklist in mind to keep kids safe while they're having fun.

1. Protection against bugs, use insect repellents to guard against ticks, which can carry lyme disease, and mosquitoes, which can carry the West Nile Virus and other viruses. Many repellents are made with DEET, an effective insecticide that is toxic or even potentially deadly if swallowed. If you do use a product containing DEET, it's crucial not to apply the product to a child's hands or face to avoid possible ingestion; it's also important to wash off the product before bed to prevent overexposure to the chemical.

2. Wear long sleeve shirts and long pants when going outside, particularly at dusk when mosquitoes are more likely to be present.

3. Never leave stagnant pools of water around the house. Pools of water can serve as breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

4. Avoid using scented soaps or

perfumes on your child. And do not allow your child to walk around carrying sweetened beverages, such as fruit juices. These sweet, strong scents can attract bees and wasps and increase your child's risk of being stung.

5. Prevent Dehydration. Whether your child is playing soccer with teammates or running around in the park with some buddies, it's important to keep in mind that frequent water breaks are very important to prevent dehydration. Your child should drink water before exercise and during breaks, which should be about every 15 to 20 minutes. On particularly hot and humid days, it's also a good idea for parents to spray down kids with some water from a spray bottle.

6. Practice Food Safety. Food borne illnesses increase in the summer because bacteria grow faster in warmer temperatures and humidity. On top of that, more people are eating and preparing food outdoors, at picnics and barbecues, where refrigeration and places to wash hands are not readily available.

In conclusion have a happy and safe summer from all of us at the Sac and Fox Nation Tribal Police Department.

SAMHSA Alerts Fentanyl Crisis

On July 15th SAMHSA issued an alert regarding a resurgence of Fentanyl. There has been an outbreak of overdoses and deaths involving fentanyl combined with heroin or cocaine reported in a number of urban areas in the United States, including, among other, Chicago (IL), Detroit (MI), Philadelphia (PA), and Camden (NJ). These deaths do not appear to be from the misuse of prescription-grade fentanyl. These reports have led to local DEA and CDC investigations as well as local and national health information efforts to alert first responders, hospital emergency rooms, health care providers, and the community about this new public health problem.

Fentanyl, a schedule II prescription narcotic analgesic, is roughly 50-80 times more potent than morphine. This medication is used to manage both pain during surgery and chronic moderate to severe pain for persons who already are physically tolerant to opiates. However, fentanyl also can be produced in clandestine laboratories in powder form and mixed with or substituted for heroin.

Recently, Montreal police reported a large bust of 10,000 pills of Desmethy Fentanyl, a derivative of the painkiller Fentanyl, as well as 1,500 kilograms of ingredients that could produce at least 3 million

more pills. While attempting to look like pharmaceutically manufactured tablets, as seen in the photo above, the rough and crumbly form is a tell-tale sign of the counterfeit production. It was the first time the narcotic has been seized in Canada.

Close to 300,000 pills were seized in the raids including OxyContin, Ecstasy, and a type of amphetamine. Some were found in a makeshift laboratory that had been set up in a garage in highly unsanitary conditions with highly toxic chemicals causing law enforcement officials to become ill. Authorities stated some of these drugs were to be sold online.

The shipments appear to have come from China and could be finding their way to northern cities in the USA, as indicated by the SAMHSA alert. Canadian authorities described the shipment as, “a dangerous new street drug 40 times stronger than heroin.”

The SAMHSA alert went onto say, “Recent research has demonstrated that availability of both naloxone and opioid agonist therapy is strongly associated with decreases in opioid overdose fatalities.” To find such agonist therapies go to SAMHSA

Painkillers Are Killing Oklahoma Women

Overdose death rates from prescription painkillers are rising much faster in middle-age women than men, with the trend more pronounced in Oklahoma than in most states, according to a report released in July by the Centers for Disease Control. Overdose death rates from prescription painkillers are rising much faster in middle-age women than men. Oklahoma overdose death rates are growing faster than national rates. Female overdose death rates are highest among American Indians, Alaska Natives and non-Hispanic whites from 45 to 54 years of age, the CDC report showed.

Pregnant Opiate Addicts

A small but growing number of clinics for mothers-to-be are popping up around the country in response to a prescription-drug epidemic, which has triggered a rise of addicted mothers giving birth to drug-dependent babies.

Between 2000 and 2009, the number of newborns showing symptoms of withdrawal from opioids, which are commonly used to treat pain, rose in the U.S. to 3.4 births per 1,000, according to a 2012 study in the Journal of the American Medical Association. To find such treatment contact:

Heroin On The Rise

With cheap heroin so prevalent and a massive prescription painkiller addiction epidemic, heroin addiction has been spiking as law enforcement cracks down on painkillers. “The struggle here is that we’re creating a generation of very young addicts in a society where drug intervention programs are not always readily available. If we do not act, this drug problem will probably begin to drain our health care dollars over the next 15 years,” says Dr. Manny Alvarez.

The Sac and Fox Nation will abide by these policies in keeping the Nation's swimming pool safe. Having complete and accurate records will be instrumental to the Sac and Fox Nation should any health or other concerns arise.

Seasonal Operation of Swimming Pool

The Sac and Fox Nation Swimming Pool shall be open from Memorial Day weekend thru Labor Day weekend.

Schedule of Days and Hours

The pool will be open Tuesday thru Sunday. Mondays will be closed for maintenance and treatment of pool.

Hours of operation for swimming are 1:00 PM to 7:00 PM Tuesday thru Sunday. Hours of Operation for Lifeguards 12:00 PM to 8:00 PM Tuesday thru Sunday

Admission Prices

\$2.00 for the general public
\$1.00 for Sac and Fox Nation tribal members

Private Parties

Evenings from 7:00 PM till 9:00 PM

Party is required to fill out proper paperwork for rental agreements as well as for scheduling. Arrangements will be administered through the Office of Government. Pool rental prohibited during the week of the Nation's annual celebration.

\$50.00 (2 hour) for the general public

\$25.00 (2 hour) for Sac and Fox Nation tribal members Certified Lifeguards with CPR/First Aid training will be on duty. No waiving of fees. No exceptions.

Pool Rules

1. Bathers must take shower and remove excess body lotion before entering the pool
2. Persons with communicable diseases, open wounds, or bandages, must not enter pool

es, open wounds, or bandages, must not enter pool

3. Animals are not allowed inside pool enclosure
4. Swimming alone is prohibited
5. Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult
6. Running or rough play is prohibited in and around pool
7. No glassware allowed in pool area
8. No food or drink allowed in pool
9. "Cut offs" if worn, must be hemmed
10. This pool has a bather load limit of 120 persons
11. No alcohol or tobacco allowed

Wading (Kiddy) Pool

Wading pool has a "no lifeguard on duty" sign posted. Each child will have to have a parent or guardian accompany them. No children over 12 years old allowed in wading pool.

Diving Board and Waterslides

No diving, just jumping off of board. Waterslide rules include sitting position only. No head first sliding. No jumping off of waterslide. Only one person at a time on the waterslide.

Emergency Phone and Numbers

Emergency phone will be available on site. Emergency phone numbers will be posted.

Emergency Closure or Delay of Daily Operations

In the event of severe weather or unforeseen occurrences appropriate Sac and Fox Nation employees shall make determination to close. These include, but not limited to the Sac and Fox Nation Safety Officer, Maintenance, Police, Security, and Lifeguards.

10 QUESTIONS About Enrolling in Health Insurance Exchange Plans

1. HOW WILL I BENEFIT FROM HAVING HEALTH INSURANCE?

Contract Health Services (CHS) does not have enough money to meet all the needs, so there is a priority list and sometimes CHS runs out of money. If you have health insurance, you can get the health services you need even if it is not high on the CHS priority list and even if CHS is out of money. Health insurance will pay for things that your Tribal or IHS program does not provide, such as medical specialists, tests, emergency room visits, and hospital care.

2. IF I ENROLL IN AN EXCHANGE PLAN, WILL I HAVE TO GET MY HEALTH CARE FROM A CLINIC FAR AWAY FROM WHERE I LIVE?

No. You can continue to use your Tribal or IHS clinic. Let them know that you have insurance so that they can receive payment for services they provide to you.

3. WILL THERE BE A COST TO ME TO ENROLL IN A HEALTH INSURANCE PLAN?

When you use the Health Insurance Exchange website, you will find out if you qualify for programs that pay all or a portion of the costs of health insurance. Your Tribe may be able to help with any additional costs.

4. I AM ELIGIBLE FOR INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE SO WHY DO I NEED TO HAVE HEALTH INSURANCE?

The Indian Health Service is funded at only about half the level of need, and Tribes only get about half the funding they need from the Indian Health Service. Your Indian health clinic must get the other half of funding from other sources, such as billing insurance. Health insurance is optional for American Indians and Alaska Natives. There is no penalty if you choose not to enroll in an Exchange plan.

5. WHAT ABOUT THE FEDERAL TRUST RESPONSIBILITY? SHOULDN'T THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PAY FOR ALL OF MY HEALTH CARE?

The Federal government is paying for Indian health care through many programs in addition to the Indian Health Service. In the new Health Insurance Exchanges, the Federal government is paying a portion of the cost of insurance. Also, there are special provisions for the Federal government to pay the co-pays and deductibles for American Indians and Alaska Natives enrolled in Exchange plans.

6. ISN'T IT "DOUBLE DIPPING" FOR IHS OR MY TRIBAL CLINIC TO RECEIVE FUNDING FROM CONGRESS AND ALSO BILL MY INSURANCE?

Congress expects IHS and Tribes to bill other insurance. The funding for Indian health care comes from many sources. The money is needed to provide services for everyone in our Tribal communities.

7. WHAT IF I ALREADY HAVE HEALTH INSURANCE?

If you already have health insurance through your job, you will not be eligible for the Health Insurance Exchange. If you are eligible for Medicaid, Medicare or the State Child Health Insurance Program (SCHIP), you will not be able to enroll in an Exchange plan. Tell your Indian health clinic about your health insurance.

8. HOW CAN I GET HELP TO ENROLL IN EXCHANGE PLANS?

Your Indian health clinic can help you find out if you are eligible to enroll in an Exchange plan. Starting in 2013, there will be a new website that simplifies the eligibility and enrollment process. Your privacy will be protected by federal law and the information you provide will be treated confidentially.

9. WHAT ABOUT ALL THE PAPERWORK FROM HEALTH INSURANCE COMPANIES?

You can ask that the paperwork be sent to your Indian health clinic instead of your home. Your clinic can monitor the paperwork and let you know when there's something you need to do.

10. WHAT SHOULD I DO NEXT?

Go to your Indian health clinic and ask for help to see if you qualify for an Exchange plan. Bring your Social Security card. You have a choice. If you decide to enroll in a health insurance plan, you will be helping yourself, your family and your community!

What Tribal Members Need to Know About HEALTH INSURANCE EXCHANGES

WHAT IS HEALTH INSURANCE?

Health insurance is a little like car insurance. For car insurance, you pay a premium to the insurance company and they pay a portion of the costs if your car is wrecked. If you have health insurance, the insurance plan will pay for a portion of the costs of your visit to the doctor, emergency room and hospital stays, your medical tests, and your prescription drugs. Health insurance companies offer several types of plans that cover different health services.

HEALTH INSURANCE EXCHANGES ALLOW PEOPLE TO PURCHASE HEALTH INSURANCE PLANS.

A Health Insurance Exchange is a computer website where individuals can buy health insurance for themselves and their family, small businesses can buy health insurance for their employees, and Tribes can buy health insurance for their members. Starting January 1, 2014, there will be an Exchange in each state operated by state or federal government.

THE COST FOR HEALTH INSURANCE DEPENDS ON YOUR INCOME.

The **premium** is a monthly amount that is paid to the insurance company. The federal government pays a portion of the premiums for low and middle income people who purchase insurance through Exchanges. Sometimes Tribes or other organizations will pay for the rest of the premium cost. Check with your Tribal clinic to see what they recommend.

AMERICAN INDIANS AND ALASKA NATIVES WHO ENROLL IN HEALTH INSURANCE EXCHANGE PLANS DO NOT HAVE COST SHARING.

Cost sharing is the term used for both the deductible and co-pay. A **deductible** is the amount most consumers pay each year before the insurance company pays for health services. A **co-pay** is the amount most consumers pay at each visit. For American Indians and Alaska Natives with health insurance, there is never any cost sharing when you get your services from your Tribal or IHS clinic. The rules for cost sharing for services provided outside Indian health clinics can be complicated, but your Tribal clinic will know how to help so that you never have to pay cost sharing.

HEALTH INSURANCE EXCHANGE HAS A WEBSITE.

- People at your Tribal or IHS clinic can help you access the Exchange website.
- You will be asked a few questions and the information will be entered into the computer.
- The website will determine if you are eligible for Exchange plans or other programs, such as Medicaid and State Child Health Insurance Program (SCHIP).
- Information from your federal income tax will be used to determine whether you qualify for programs that reduce or eliminate the cost of health insurance.
- After you see what programs are available, you can decide whether you want to enroll. Enrollment can be done on the website.

TRIBAL EDUCATION (RAP) PROGRAMS

The Sac and Fox Nation Education Department would like to make all tribal members aware of the programs we offer. These programs are funded with Revenue Allocation Plan funds and are available to Sac and Fox Nation tribal members only. All awards are based on the availability of funds.

School Clothing/Supplies Grant

Funds are provided to assist Sac and Fox Nation school-aged (Pre-K through 12th grade) tribal members in obtaining adequate and appropriate school clothing and school supplies. Each eligible student will receive a check in the amount of \$200.00 for clothing and \$50.00 for school supplies until funds are depleted. Applicants may only apply one time per school year. Funding is on a first-come, first-served basis. Applications may be turned in beginning June 1st until September 10th, 2013, or until funds are depleted.

8th Grade Incentive

Funds are provided to encourage Sac and Fox Nation tribal members to complete their education and to strive for excellence. All Sac and Fox Nation tribal members who have successfully completed the 8th grade in the current year are eligible to apply and will receive \$100.00 in incentive funds. Verification of completion must accompany application. Applications will be accepted until funding is depleted.

12th Grade/GED Incentive

Funds are provided to encourage Sac and Fox Nation tribal members to complete their education and to strive for excellence. All Sac and Fox Nation tribal members who have successfully completed the 12th grade or who have successfully obtained their GED in the current year are eligible to apply and will receive \$200.00 in incentive funds. Verification of completion must accompany the application. Funding is on a first-come, first-served basis, and will continue until funds are depleted.

12th Grade Graduation Grant

Funds are provided to assist Sac and Fox Nation high school senior tribal members to acquire the following: class ring, senior pictures, graduation cap and gown, and graduation announcements. All Sac and Fox Nation tribal members who are currently enrolled in the 12th grade may participate in this program. Each eligible student may receive up to \$500.00 in assistance, with the completed application and the vendor's invoice submitted. The funds will be paid directly to the vendors. Funding is on a first-come, first-served basis, until funds are depleted.

Degree/Certification Incentive

Funds are provided to encourage Sac and Fox Nation tribal members to complete their education and to strive for excellence. All Sac and Fox Nation tribal members who have successfully completed a post-secondary degree or adult vocational training certification in the current year may participate in this program. Incentive funds in the amount of \$1,000.00 will be awarded for post-secondary degrees and incentive funds in the amount of \$750.00 will be awarded for adult vocational training certifications.

Section 201. Election Days

(c) Any such Primary Election shall be held at least thirty (30) days prior to the regular General Election.
Primary Election: July 27, 2013

Section 201. Election Days

(a) Regular General Elections of members of the Business Committee and Grievance Committee shall be held on the last Saturday in August of each election year. All other required Tribal elections shall be held upon call of the Business Committee.
General Election: August 31, 2013

Section 208. Poll Watchers

Each candidate may designate in writing one person, not a candidate, to watch the activities at the polls. Such designation shall be presented to Election Board Officials prior to the election. Such persons may not interfere in any way with the conduct of the election, but may observe only. Any poll watcher interfering with the election or attempting to electioneer, in any way, shall be rejected from the poll area by a Sergeant of Arms or law enforcement officer.

Section 302. Voting List

(b) One copy of the voting list shall be maintained in the Tribal Office and be open to public inspection during Regular business hours no later than sixty (60) days prior to the election.

GENERAL ELECTION: Open to the public: Tuesday, July 2, 2013

Section 303. Challenges to Voting Lists

(a) At any time more than twenty (20) days before the Primary Election and General Election, any person may challenge the voting eligibility of any person whose name appears on said list, or may apply to have their name added to said list by filing an application with the Election Board. The application shall clearly indicate the substance of the challenge, the specific names challenged, and the relief requested.

Section 402. Filing for Office

To be eligible for election and have one's name placed upon the ballot Notice of Candidacy for an elective office must be filed with: The Tribal Secretary after depositing the candidate's non-refundable filing fee of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) (cashiers check only) with the Tribal Treasurer during regular business hours at the Tribal Office complex not later than sixty-five (65) calendar days prior to the date of the Primary Election and General Election. The Tribal Secretary shall notify the Chairman of the Election Board of all candidates who have filed for office.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Closing date to File for Office: Thursday, May 23, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

Section 403. Petition for Office

A petition of ten (10) or more members of Council may submit a written notice with required filing fees of two-hundred (\$200.00) non-refundable (cashiers check only), no later than sixty-five (65) calendar days prior to the date of the Primary Election and/or General Election stating the name of the candidate, age, birth date, and proof of actual residence and domicile.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Deadline to Petition for Office: Thursday, May 23, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

If No Primary Election is held, Closing Date for General Election: (Only if no one files for one office) Thursday, June 27, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

Section 406. Withdrawals

Any candidate for office may withdraw by filing a written notice of withdrawal with the Election Board at any time within ten (10) days after the closing date of filing for office. Such notice shall contain the candidates name, the office filed for, a statement of withdrawal and shall be notarized or sworn to before a person authorized to administer oaths. (Required filing fee non-refundable)

Section 408. Contest of Candidate Eligibility

Any candidate or eligible voter may challenge a candidate's legal qualifications to run for office by filing a written petition with the Election Board within three (3) business days of the closing of the filing period. Each petition shall state with particularity the reasons the candidate is not eligible to file for office. There is a one-hundred dollars (\$100.00) non-refundable cashier's check contest fee.

Section 602. Application for Absentee Ballot

Qualified voters wishing to cast vote by absentee ballots shall notify the Election Board not sooner than ninety (90) days and not later than thirty (30) days prior to the election. Such notices must be in writing and must include the correct mailing address of the person making the request. Only one ballot per written request.

The Election Board shall maintain an accurate record of all absentee ballots so issued, including the name and address of the voter to whom the ballot was issued and the date of issue.

Section 706. The Tally

The Election Board shall unlock the ballot box (es), shall remove the ballots one by one, and as each one is removed, the clerks shall read off the names of the candidates marked thereupon. At least two election officials shall view each ballot, and each counter shall keep a separate tally of the votes cast. Each candidate may select a watcher of their choice, not a candidate, to observe and keep a separate record of the tally of the ballots, and who shall not interfere with the tally process. After the tally is complete, all ballots, absentee ballots, voter registers, and ballot boxes shall be transported to the Sac and Fox Nation Tribal Court House.

A candidate or qualified voter contesting a Tribal Election shall, within ten (10) days after completion of the tally of the election and declaration of the results, shall deposit a two hundred dollar (\$200.00) non-refundable cashier's check contest filing fee with the Tribal Treasurer, file with the Election Board a statement in writing setting forth their particular grounds for the contest. The statement shall be verified by affidavit of the contestor (s) that they believe the matters and things therein contained are true. After the statement is filed the Election Board shall set a time for a hearing of the contest, no later than ten (10) days after the date on which the statement of contest was filed. Written notice of such hearing shall be mailed or delivered to each candidate for the office contested. Any party to the election protest and the Election Board shall have the right to view the election ballots and records in the presence of the Court Clerk in the clerk's office. Any party to the protest or a Tribal member shall be entitled to receive a photocopy of said documents certified as true and correct copies by the Court Clerk upon payment to said clerk of the normal and customary charges.

Said certified copies shall be received as evidence by the Election Board in like manner as an original. Alternatively the Election Board, upon request of a party or on its own motion, may convene a hearing for any protested election at the Tribal Courthouse for the purpose of review of said election materials. After hearing the proofs and allegations of the contestants, the Election Board shall make their findings and shall have authority to pronounce their judgment either setting aside, or confirming the election.

Such request must be accompanied by a non-refundable cashier's check of two-hundred dollars (\$200.00) made payable to the Sac and Fox Nation. Said check shall be forwarded to the Tribal Secretary-Treasurer to be credited against the cost of the recount. The Election Board shall meet and decide within ten (10) days of receipt of the notice whether or not the reasons listed in the request are sufficient to cause a recount of ballots.

**INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE
 WATER AND SEWER
 ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE**

The Indian Health Service, Office of Environmental Health and Engineering, offers programs to install water and sewer facilities to qualified Indian Homeowners. Funding and construction of sanitation facilities, such as wells, water service lines, septic tanks and drain fields, wastewater lagoons and sewer service lines, are available.

Minimum eligibility requirements include:

- Property must be located within the local Indian Health Service jurisdiction: The greater portion of Oklahoma County; Pottawatomie County north of the North Canadian River; Cleveland County west of the Indian Meridian; Lincoln County; Logan County, and a portion of southern Payne County.
- You must be a member of a federally recognized Indian tribe, band or group;
- If renting, you must obtain a lease agreement (minimum of five years) and a copy of the landowner’s deed/title and CDIB. Property owner must possess a Certified Degree of Indian Blood (CDIB).
- HUD homes must be paid in full before services can be provided.

Documentation of tribal affiliation and home ownership or long-term lease will be required with the application for services. Mobile homes must be tied down, skirted and wheels removed prior to service.

Absentee Shawnee and Citizen Potawatomi Nation tribal members must apply for services through their tribal OEH offices.

Please note that applying for service does not guarantee you will receive service. Service depends on the availability of funding.

“American Indians and the Civil War” Makes a Landmark Debut in Washington, DC

Introducing Americas First Nations to the World

Albuquerque, New Mexico (July 31, 2013) American Indian Alaska Native Tourism Association (AIANTA) President Mary Jane Ferguson and AIANTA executives presented a copy of the cultural heritage interpretive book, American Indians and the Civil War to Department of the Interior (DOI) Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs Kevin Washburn in Washington, DC.

“AIANTA is dedicated to the development of an American Indian tourism industry that promotes the authenticity of our cultural presentations and history,” said AIANTA President Mary Jane Ferguson and member of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. “We hope this book will enlighten the readers’ understanding to the significant contributions and sacrifices that Native Americans have given to our shared history.”

Through a cooperative agreement between the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) and AIANTA, copies of the book were sent to tribal colleges and universities, Indian primary and secondary schools across America, in addition to tribal museums and cultural centers. AIANTA President Mary Jane Ferguson, DOI Assistant Secretary- Indian Affairs Kevin Washburn and Associate Director of Interpretation and Education for the National Park Service Julia Washburn sent these educational institutions a joint letter to express the significance of this landmark publication. “The Bureau of Indian Affairs and Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) are thankful that we were able to support the inclusion of American Indian tribes in the sesquicentennial of the Civil War,” said Assistant Secretary-Indian Affairs Kevin Washburn. “The documentation of important tribal histories throughout this publication is essential for our Nation’s history.”

The National Park Service (NPS) made a commitment to include American Indian voices in the 2011-2015 150th

anniversary commemoration of America’s Civil War. To honor that commitment, NPS partnered with AIANTA, BIA, BIE and publisher Eastern National to produce the book.

“Native American history is American history,” said Julia Washburn, Associate Director of Interpretation and Education, National Park Service. “This is the first opportunity of many commemorations in history that will include American Indian voices. The NPS is grateful to our partners at AIANTA, BIA and BIE for helping develop the book and for funding the outreach to tribal schools.”

Book authors include 11 Native American and non- Native American scholars from across the country, including Editor Robert K. Sutton, Daniel Wildcat and Elliot West. American Indians and the Civil War is now available at www.eParks.com and in select national parks across the country for \$9.95.



Sac and Fox Veterans Attend Native American Stand Down

Several Sac and Fox Nation Veterans and family members recently participated in the Shawnee Tribal Stand down meeting held at Gordon Cooper Vo-Tech, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

Our Veterans arrived early and stayed late to assist in the set-up including everything from a huge tent (twice set-up because of strong winds) to unloading supplies and setting up booths.

Thirty-one separate and unique agencies participated along with nine different behavioral health agencies and eight primary health care agencies.

One hundred and forty nine veterans received help from at least ten stations

that were set up.


Help ranged from food, clothing, hair care, dental, physical exams and help with paper work just to name a few.

At least three female veterans received services, which were all currently homeless.

Fifty-one vets sheets were turned in and MAS registered fifty-nine.

The Day The Dollar Dies

To get out before China unleashes its hoard. Jim Rickards is on CNN saying it's a "full-on revolt against the dollar standard." The ZeroHedge blog has it up in doomsday 100-point font: "Is this the start of WW3?" Rumors begin to swirl on the trading floor and on TV screens around the world that America's biggest banks are caught short and unable to cover their multibillion-dollar positions in the derivatives market.

12:03 p.m. EST - Bank of America CEO Brian T. Moynihan denies that the bank has a liquidity problem.

12:07 p.m. EST
Citigroup CEO Michael Corbat calls the buzz about his bank's derivatives positions "malicious rumors started by speculators that are just false." The bank is "fundamentally sound," he insists.

12:15 p.m. EST
Warren Buffet warns of contagion to the insurance sector.

12:30 p.m. EST, Federal Reserve Bank, New York

Visibly agitated, Federal Reserve Bank Chairman Ben Bernanke says that due to market conditions the Fed will temporarily purchase "unlimited" amounts of treasuries to restore confidence in the market. "The Federal Reserve is committed to a strong dollar policy and any damage to the banking system is limited and contained," he said.

His announcement has the opposite effect. Instead of instilling confidence, investors take it as confirmation of a worst-case scenario—and a giant sell signal on the dollar. The dollar index drops into free fall, gold jumps by more than \$700 per ounce, and silver hits \$100. Ten minutes later, Bill Gross at bond giant PIMCO is being interviewed by Lauren Lyster on MSNBC. She asks if we are witnessing the end of the dollar as the world's reserve currency. Gross confirms that he began shifting most of his \$1 trillion-plus fund out of dollar-denominated assets more than a year ago. He put the money in Europe back when everyone else thought it was falling apart. "The writing was on the dollar's wall a long time ago," he says. "America's mushrooming debt and the lack of political will to address its spending problems assured the demise of the dollar. I just didn't realize it would happen so fast."

In an hour and a half, the dollar has lost more than half its value.

Fox News is saying people should spend their dollars now before they are worthless. Dennis Kneale is actually comparing the collapse of the dollar to the Argentine peso and the Greek drachma.

12:39 p.m. EST, Atlanta, Chicago, Phoenix, Oakland ...

Riots are reported in shopping malls and business districts across several major cities, as people awake to the fact that the value of their cash is evaporating. Their savings and investments have lost more than half of their purchasing power compared to other currencies. Local news footage shows empty store shelves and malfunctioning ATMs. People panic and rush grocery stores to stock up. Customers claim widespread price gouging. Mobs of young people rampage through Birmingham, Cincinnati, Chicago.

1:02 p.m. EST, Washington, D.C.

President Obama holds an emergency press conference. "This morning, December 7, 2015—a date that will live in infamy—the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by overseas governments in an attempt to discredit the dollar and take away its status as the world's reserve currency.

"Let me be clear: To even entertain the idea of the United States of America not paying its bills is irresponsible. It's absurd.

"Some have questioned the integrity of our nation's bullion reserves. Believe me, the gold is there. When Germany requested its gold holdings back, we began returning it. I now urge my German counterparts to confirm Europe's commitment to using the dollar as a reserve currency.

"I have authorized Chairman Bernanke to implement capital controls to prevent millionaires and speculators from taking money out of the country. I am also issuing an executive order that will limit private ownership of gold. I am also directing Congress to pass new tax legislation and tariffs on Chinese goods.

"Unfortunately, some elements in our cities seek to gain from this crisis: speculators on Wall Street and rioters on Main Street. To protect the common

good, I hereby declare a temporary state of emergency and authorize Homeland Security, FEMA and the National Guard to restore order to our great cities ..."

1:25 p.m. EST, New York

The plunging markets go into free fall after the president's announcements. Gold jumps another \$800, silver is at \$175, oil at \$250. The dollar hits an all-time low. Investors around the world flee the dollar. American cities have started to burn.

Back in the real world...

Although the dates and events in this scenario are obviously fictitious, the principle isn't.

In fact, such an economic disaster is imminent enough that the Pentagon held its first-ever financial war games back in 2009. Instead of carrier movements, tactical strikes and aerial bombardments, the weapons were currencies, stocks, bonds, interest rates and derivatives. But just like real war exercises, the purpose was the same: to discover fatal weaknesses and how the enemy might exploit them.

Wall Street banker Jim Rickards participated in the war games. In his book Currency Wars, he writes that the Pentagon is clumsy at financial warfare.

Financial war is not beyond America's horizon. Whether or not politicians and the Fed will publicly acknowledge it, the war has already begun.

In 2010, Brazilian Finance Minister Guido Mantega was the first public official to confirm what everyone knew but no one would admit. "We're in the midst of an international currency war," he told industrial leaders in Sao Paulo. "This threatens us because it takes away our competitiveness. ... The advanced countries are seeking to devalue their currencies."

While the U.S. and other governments might throw out phrases like "commitment to a strong dollar" every now and then, what many of them are actually doing is actively and openly devaluing their currencies to gain unfair short-term economic advantages.

Faced with unacceptably high unemployment and a stagnant global economy, the world's leading economies are resorting to currency manipulation to steal a greater piece of a shrinking economic pie. The short-sighted goal is to weaken the currency to make domestic goods cheaper for foreigners to buy and foreign goods more expensive to purchase. This beggar-thy-neighbor strategy is highly contentious and potentially explosive.

In 2012 alone, global central banks cut interest rates 75 times in an effort to weaken their currencies.

"Ever since the Fed launched QE2 in August 2010, we have been in the currency war regime," confirms Alessio de Longis, who runs the Oppenheimer Currency Opportunities Fund. "It will continue to be this."

Regardless of who started it, the war is heating up.

Latest Currency Shot

When Shinzo Abe was elected prime minister of Japan in December, it heralded a new stage in the global currency war. He immediately announced that Tokyo would no longer be neutral. It would implement a massive \$1.4 trillion quantitative easing (money-printing) plan to reduce the value of the yen. He said the yen had risen too high (in reality, the dollar, yuan and euro had fallen, making the yen appear to have risen). He then bullied the Bank of Japan into doubling its acceptable inflation level. Abe's intent was plain: to boost job creation by the same artificial means employed by the U.S. and China—currency devaluation leading to increased exports. And he was very open about it.

A "daring monetary policy is essential" if Japan is to beat deflation and drive down the value of the yen, he said. "We strongly expect the BOJ [Bank of Japan] to conduct aggressive monetary easing with a clear price target."

Bowing to the pressure, the central bank announced it would potentially buy unlimited amounts of government bonds. Since then, the yen has lost 25 percent of its value against the euro and about 13 percent against the dollar—and Japan's exporters grabbed market share.

"Ever since the new government took control, it feels as though Japan is filled with the spirit for economic revival," Toyota executive Takahiko Ijichi said in March.

Outside of Japan, Toyota's competitors

are filled with a different spirit.

China is "fully prepared" for currency war, its central bank deputy governor, Yi Gang, said that same month. "China will take into full account the quantitative easing policies implemented by central banks of foreign countries."

Just hours before the BOJ announcement, German Bundesbank President Jens Weidmann warned that populist governments threatened to unleash competitive currency wars, as politicians pushed central banks to weaken currencies and steal trade. It was a message aimed at the big powers: America, China and Japan. Monetary policy risked becoming a political tool, he warned.

By February, the risk of currency war morphing into trade war was so high that the G-20 issued a joint declaration: "We will refrain from competitive devaluation.... We will not target our

exchange rates for competitive purposes, will resist all forms of protectionism and keep our markets open."

But joint platitudes aside, the world is fully engaged in currency war and stands on the brink of full-scale trade war.

My closing comments: I don't mean to be the voice of doom and gloom but the outrageous spending by the U.S. Government needs to stop ASAP. I'm sure you've all seen on TV the video of IRS workers at some expensive conference (to us), learning how to line dance and just recently on TV, guess what? These IRS employees are all going to get bonuses—something about the bonuses for them are covered in the collective bargaining in place for them! A U.S. Congressman (I didn't catch his name) has introduced a Bill to do away with collective bargaining – I hope this Bill passes and soon!

2013 PER CAPITA PAYMENT INFORMATION

- You must be enrolled by Monday, September 30, 2013 to be eligible for the 2013 per capita payment.
- The tribal membership roll will be certified by Monday, September 30, 2013.
- A complete Internal Revenue Service (IRS) form must be received by the Sac and Fox Nation Office of Enrollment before a check can be distributed.
- The Sac and Fox Nation Finance Department will mail the 2013 IRS form 1099 by Friday, January 31, 2014.
- No official date has been set at this time for disbursement of the per capita payment.
- All checks will be mailed, no exceptions.
- If Enrollment has a different mailing address for you, they will change their records to match what is listed on the W-9 form.

IRS Form W-9

It is critical that the IRS Form W-9 be completed correctly and thoroughly for each individual tribal member; not doing so could result in a delay of you receiving your per capita payment. The Office of Enrollment will verify all information including name, current mailing address and social security number. The form must be signed and dated. IRS Form W-9 can be found at <http://www.irs.gov>.

Required Legal Documents

Please ensure the Office of Enrollment has a copy of your social security card. The name and signature on the IRS Form W-9 must match the name on the social security card. If your name has changed due to marriage, divorce, adoption, etc., it is your responsibility to provide any legal documentation (including a social security card which reflects your new name) to the Office of Enrollment.

Minors

Parents or guardians are responsible for providing an IRS Form W-9 for minor children; not doing so could result in the minor's authorized amount of payment being deposited along with the remaining balance into the minor's trust fund account.

Tax Liability Notification

What are the withholding requirements for distributions that are made per a Revenue Allocation Plan (RAP)? The first step is to identify the source of funds used for the distribution. Unless the source of funds is specifically exempt from taxation, the amounts that make up the distributions to tribal members are taxable.

Which funds get reported on Form 1099-Misc? Distributions could be derived from many sources, including the profits from a tribal business other than a Class II or Class III gaming operation, interest income on investments, or rental payments from tribal lands. All these payments require a tribe to prepare a Form 1099-MISC

When does a person receive a Form 1099-Misc, Statement for Recipients of Miscellaneous Income? If a person receives **\$600 or more in 1 calendar year** from the same source, that amount must be reported on a Form 1099, and that Form 1099-Misc. must be provided to the individual.

It is only the amount distributed from NET GAMING REVENUE that is subject to withholding. The Internal Revenue Code provides that "Every person, including an Indian tribe, making a payment to a member of an Indian tribe from the net revenues of any Class II or Class III gaming activity conducted or licensed by such tribe, shall deduct and withhold from such payment a tax in an amount equal to such payment's proportionate share of the annualized tax." The amount to withhold is provided in Withholding Tables found in IRS Publication 15-A, Employer's Supplemental Tax Guide.

If the Indian tribe anticipates making a distribution of any kind, the Indian tribe needs the tribal members' Social Security number before the distribution is made. If an Indian tribe does not know a tribal member's Social Security number at the time of distribution, the distribution is subject to "backup withholding" (at 28% in 2009). (Source: Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Indian Tribal Governments Frequently Asked Questions, Last Reviewed or Updated: April 22, 2013)

Per capita payments could affect any Tribal, Federal, State, and/or Local benefits you may receive or programs in which you participate. The Sac and Fox Nation encourage you to check with your tax accountant or benefit specialist.
