Local News

State Legislators Justin Wood and Jason Smalley met with the Business Committee on June 13th to discuss the concerns of our Sac & Fox Nation, how they can better represent our tribal members

within their respective districts, and possible future legislation that they may introduce on our behalf.

Shawnee Mayor Wes Mainord and Senator Ron Sharp met with me on June 14th to discuss possible partnerships between the City of Shawnee and our Nation and representation of our tribal citizens.

Future meetings with other members of our state Legislature are being planned before they return to session, so please contact the Business Committee with your concerns so we can share them on your behalf. There was discussion to possibly have a "Town Hall" meeting with each representative within their district so you can personally address them. We will pursue these possibilities in the near future.

State News

Tribal Leaders from Oklahoma met with Oklahoma Governor Mary Fallin in Tulsa, OK on June 11th to discuss many issues. Only the Chairman, President, Governor, or Chief of each nation or their representative was allowed to sit in the meeting, which included 23 Indian Nations, to discuss their concerns. Tobacco Compacts were at the top of the list, the need to educate the Governor about our respective Nations and how the tribal governments operate, the removal of burn bans from the tobacco compacts, the economic impact of the Nations upon Oklahoma, and the agreement of future one-on-one meetings with the same format of leader-to-leader consultation and not representatives - personal dialogue. This meeting resulted from the United Indian Nations of Oklahoma, Kansas, and Texas (UINOKT) joining forces to request this meeting.

National News

VAWA 2013 | NOTICE OF PILOT PROJECT & NCAI PILOT WORKGROUP MEETING AT NCAI MID YEAR - JUNE 24, 2013

The Department of Justice has posted its Notice of Proposed Procedures for the VAWA 2013 Tribal Pilot Project. The deadline to submit a preliminary expression of interest to participate in the VAWA Tribal Pilot Project is July 15, 2013, although participants can join at a later date. The Business Committee has submitted an interest to participate.

The DOJ will launch an Intertribal Technical Assistance Working Group on Special Domestic Violence Criminal Jurisdiction (ITWG). NCAI is hosting a Pre-Meeting on Monday, June 24th in conjunction with the 2013 Mid Year Conference in Reno, Nevada. The Pre-Meeting is dedicated as the 1st Intertribal Working Group Meeting for

the VAWA 2013 Implementation Pilot Project. I will attend this Pre-Meeting as will our Attorney General Greg Bigler.

This Pre-Meeting will be an excellent opportunity to engage with Deputy Associate Attorney General Sam Hirsh, the DOJ's lead official on the Pilot Project, as well as dialogue with other interested tribes and consider whether or not to join the Pilot Project. The Department of the Interior Assistant Secretary-Indian Affairs Kevin Washburn will also be in attendance to discuss the role of DOI in the Pilot Project. The agenda for the Pre-Meeting includes discussion on: DOJ procedures, jury pools, law-trained judges and public defenders, necessary revisions of tribal codes and procedures, detention, habeas corpus, and implementing Special Domestic Violence Criminal Jurisdiction on a budget.

A quick summary of the Pilot Project follows:

Tribal jurisdiction over non-Indian domestic violence offenders becomes generally available in March of 2015, but tribes can start earlier if approved through the Pilot Project.

The Pilot Project is essentially a collaborative workgroup among tribes and the Department of Justice to develop best practices on combating domestic violence and the required criminal procedures.

The Pilot Project will have two phases. Phase One is a planning and assessment phase, which will take place in the summer and fall of 2013.

Phase Two is the implementation phase, which will start in late 2013 and run through March 7, 2015. In Phase Two, a tribe seeking approval must complete and submit an Application Questionnaire and relevant excerpts of the tribe's laws, rules, and policies.

Five years ago, I found Harry Brown's dogtags in the woods of Nijmegen.

I knew right away that I had found something really special. At home we contacted the USA Army and they told me that the soldier Harry Brown survived the war and had gone home after

the war. They did not want to give me more information, so I kept searching for him hoping that one day I could return his long lost dogtags in person.

Sadly that dream will not come true, but I did find Harry's family, and they feel like part of my family already.

Before I will return the dogtags to the Brown family after such a long time, I would like to say a few more words.

Stroud 7th Street Grand Opening Ceremony Held

Officials from the Sac & Fox Nation, City of Stroud, Stroud Industrial Authority, Stroud Chamber of Commerce and Stroud Public Schools gathered on a great accomplishment for Stroud as the city held a grand opening ceremony for the 7th Street project on Saturday. The 7th Street project was a result of the City of Stroud, the Sac & Fox Nation

and the Stroud Industrial Authority all working together to provide better access to certain areas of Stroud. For the project the city contributed \$250,000 while the Sac & Fox Nation contributed \$395,000. After the Rt. 66 Coliseum was built better access was needed to this area as well as Sac & Fox Nation trust property to the east of the colise-

um. Truman Carter, attorney for the Sac & Fox Nation, said that the tribe's priority is to give the tribal members better access to public services. Stroud City Manager called the project a great accomplishment for the City of Stroud.

I have an older sister, Darian Hill and I am the daughter of Shawn and Ursula (Walker) Hill. I enjoy powwows and dancing fancy shawl and cloth. I'm Sac and Fox, Creek, Kickapoo, Shawnee, and Potawatomi.

My mom is Ursula Walker Hill, daughter of Lela Walker. My great grandpa was the late Willard Walker Sr. who was full blood Sac and Fox member. My great grandparents were the late Ben Walker and Dora Benson who was also full blood Sac and Fox member.

Sac and Fox History
The Sac and Fox Nation came from the Great Lakes area in the 1800's. Two well known chiefs that are known today are Black Hawk and Keokuk, Black Hawk's son. We have twelve clans in the tribe: eagle, bear, wolf, fox, peace, warrior, fish, ocean, beaver, deer, potato, and snow clans. We have two tribal divisions the democrats and republicans, which are the kishkohas and the shkashas. The Sac and Fox tribe was made of two smaller tribes, the Sauks and the Foxes, that came together to make one tribe. Today the Sac and Fox Nation reside in the Payne, Lincoln, and Pottawatomie Counties in Oklahoma, where we hold our traditions today.

Veteran Background

I have many grandpas that are Veterans. The United States Army, my grandpas Willard Walker, Jr., James Walker (also in United States Air Force Veteran), and the late Leroy Walker and Henry Walker, Sr. The United States Marine Corp, my late grandpa Leonard Walker, and for the United States Navy, my late grandpa Bennie Walker. I have two Korean Veterans that are in my family: Willard Walker Jr., the late Henry Walker Sr. and on my Creek side my late grandpa Dave Hill was also a Korean Veteran for the U.S. Army.

Oklahoma Tribes Discuss Tobacco Compacts With Governor

Tribal leaders in Oklahoma recently met with Governor Mary Fallin (R) to discuss their tobacco compacts and other issues.

The United Indian Nations of Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas (UINOKT) represents 25 tribes in Oklahoma whose compacts are expiring. The tribes are aiming to present a united front at the meeting today.

"The goal is for the state and the tribal governments to meet government-to-government, to build a strong relationship and in turn, meet on a regular basis to discuss our issues and concerns," Muscogee Nation Principal Chief George Tiger said in a press release.

The meeting was held at the tribe's River Spirit Event Center.

John R. Thorpe Recipient of George F. Nolan Award

Chicago, Ill. - John R. Thorpe, former Principle Chief of the Sac and Fox Nation, was recently recognized for his Outstanding Lifetime Service to the Sac and Fox Nation and for his contributions that helped to strengthen government to government relations among Indigenous Nations and the Federal Government in tribal self- government, economic and business development, health and social program services, particularly in Indian housing.

Each year during their annual convention and trade show, the National American Indian Housing Council (NAIHC) recognizes a woman and a man whose work exemplifies significant accomplishments and long length of service to Indian country by presenting the Virginia Kizer and George F. Nolan awards.

These prestigious awards are named after: Virginia Kizer, Washoe Nation (Nevada). Virginia spent more than a quarter century of her life advocating for safe, quality, sanitary housing for Indian Nations. She served 10 years on the NAIHC Board of Directors (1988-1998). George E. Nolan, Saul Ste. Marie, Band of Chippewa (Michigan) is remembered for his spiritual energy and passion, his ability to inspire others, while serving as

NAIHC Chairman, Board of Directors from 1989-1992.

On Wednesday evening, May 22, 2013, during the annual NAIHC banquet attended by more than 400 tribal housing representatives from across the United States, John R. Thorpe, Sac and Fox Tribal member, former Sac & Fox Housing Authority Executive Director and former resident of Shawnee Oklahoma, was recognized for his lifetime of service in the preservation of tribal lands, development of tribal resources to develop tribal enterprise, improvement of quality health care, development of recreational outlets and facilities for tribal youth, restoration and preservation of tribal culture, better facilities for tribal elderly, and preservation of cultural activities and beliefs within the Sac and Fox Nation, and most notably his years of service in Indian housing.

Current Executive Director of the Sac & Fox Housing Authority Billy Komahcheet was given the honor of making the presentation as well as accepting the award in memory of John R. Thorpe. Members of the Sac & Fox Housing Board of Commissioners; Vice-Chairperson Gwen Switch and Secretary Barbara Hawkins-Ramos were present to witness the event.

Section 201. Election Days

(c) Any such Primary Election shall be held at least thirty (30) days prior to the regular General Election.
Primary Election: July 27, 2013

Section 201. Election Days

(a) Regular General Elections of members of the Business Committee and Grievance Committee shall be held on the last Saturday in August of each election year. All other required Tribal elections shall be held upon call of the Business Committee.
General Election: August 31, 2013

Section 208. Poll Watchers

Each candidate may designate in writing one person, not a candidate, to watch the activities at the polls. Such designation shall be presented to Election Board Officials prior to the election. Such persons may not interfere in any way with the conduct of the election, but may observe only. Any poll watcher interfering with the election or attempting to electioneer, in any way, shall be rejected from the poll area by a Sergeant of Arms or law enforcement officer.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Notification of Poll Watchers for the Primary Election must be in writing and received by mail eight (8) days prior to the election.

Section 302. Voting List

(b) One copy of the voting list shall be maintained in the Tribal Office and be open to public inspection during Regular business hours no later than sixty (60) days prior to the election.

GENERAL ELECTION: Open to the public: Tuesday, July 2, 2013

Section 303 Challenges to Voting Lists

(a) At any time more than twenty (20) days before the Primary Election and General Election, any person may challenge the voting eligibility of any person whose name appears on said list, or may apply to have their name added to said list by filing an application with the Election Board. The application shall clearly indicate the substance of the challenge, the specific names challenged, and the relief requested.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Deadline for Challenges: Friday, July 5, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

Section 402. Filing for Office

To be eligible for election and have one's name placed upon the ballot Notice of Candidacy for an elective office must be filed with: The Tribal Secretary after depositing the candidate's non-refundable filing fee of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) (cashiers check only) with the Tribal Treasurer during regular business hours at the Tribal Office complex not later than sixty-five (65) calendar days prior to the date of the Primary Election and General Election. The Tribal Secretary shall notify the Chairman of the Election Board of all candidates who have filed for office.

OPENING DATE to File for Office: January 2, 2013
PRIMARY ELECTION: Closing date to File for Office: Thursday, May 23, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

If No Primary Election is held, Closing Date for General Election: (Only if no one files for one office) Thursday, June 27, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

Section 403. Petition for Office

A petition of ten (10) or more members of Council may submit a written notice with required filing fees of two-hundred (\$200.00) non-refundable (cashiers check only), no later than sixty-five (65) calendar days prior to the date of the Primary Election and/or General Election stating the name of the candidate, age, birth date, and proof of actual residence and domicile.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Deadline to Petition for Office: Thursday, May 23, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

If No Primary Election is held, Closing Date for General Election: (Only if no one files for one office) Thursday, June 27, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

Section 406. Withdrawals

Any candidate for office may withdraw by filing a written notice of withdrawal with the Election Board at any time within ten (10) days after the closing date of filing for office. Such notice shall contain the candidates name, the office filed for, a statement of withdrawal and shall be notarized or sworn to before a person authorized to administer oaths. (Required filing fee non-refundable)

Section 408. Contest of Candidate Eligibility

Any candidate or eligible voter may challenge a candidate's legal qualifications to run for office by filing a written petition with the Election Board within three (3) business days of the closing of the filing period. Each petition shall state with particularity the reasons the candidate is not eligible to file for office. There is a one-hundred dollars (\$100.00) non-refundable cashier's check contest fee.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Deadline to contest Candidate Eligibility: Wednesday, May 29, 2013 by 4:30 p.m.

GENERAL ELECTION: Deadline to contest Candidate Eligibility: Tuesday, July 2, 2013 by 4:30 p.m.

Section 602. Application for Absentee Ballot

Qualified voters wishing to cast vote by absentee ballots shall notify the Election Board not sooner than ninety (90) days and not later than thirty (30) days prior to the election. Such notices must be in writing and must include the correct mailing address of the person making the request. Only one ballot per written request.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Requests will be accepted from April 28, 2013 and cannot accept requests after June 27, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

Section 603. Delivery of Absentee Ballot

As soon as the filing period for candidates has closed sixty-five (65) calendar days before the election, the Election Board will prepare a special ballot and send one to each qualified voter who has requested same. The Election Board shall maintain an accurate record of all absentee ballots so issued, including the name and address of the voter to whom the ballot was issued and the date of issue.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Thursday, May 23, 2013, 4:30 p.m.

Section 706. The Tally

The Election Board shall unlock the ballot box (es), shall remove the ballots one by one, and as each one is removed, the clerks shall read off the names of the candidates marked thereupon. At least two election officials shall view each ballot, and each counter shall keep a separate tally of the votes cast. Each candidate may select a watcher of their choice, not a candidate, to observe and keep a separate record of the tally of the ballots, and who shall not interfere with the tally process. After the tally is complete, all ballots, absentee ballots, voter registers, and ballot boxes shall be transported to the Sac and Fox Nation Tribal Court House.

Section 710. Certification of Election

The election shall be certified by the Election Board immediately after the ten (10) day period for filing an election contest expires, provided, that if an election contest petition is filed within the time period allowed, then no Certificate of Election shall be issued until after such election contest is finally decided.

Section 713. Installment in Office

Successful candidates for office whose election results are uncontested or are not involved in a run-off election shall be sworn in within ten (10) working days of the certified date, or, if there has been a delay due to election contests, run-off elections, special elections, or other cause, then as soon as reasonably practical after the election results are certified.

Section 802. Contest Petition

A candidate or qualified voter contesting a Tribal Election shall, within ten (10) days after completion of the tally of the election and declaration of the results, shall deposit a two hundred dollar (\$200.00) non-refundable cashier's check contest filing fee with the Tribal Treasurer, file with the Election Board a statement in writing setting forth their particular grounds for the contest. The statement shall be verified by affidavit of the contestor (s) that they believe the matters and things therein contained are true. After the statement is filed the Election Board shall set a time for a hearing of the contest, no later than ten (10) days after the date on which the statement of contest was filed. Written notice of such hearing shall be mailed or delivered to each candidate for the office contested. Any party to the election protest and the Election Board shall have the right to view the election ballots and records in the presence of the Court Clerk in the clerk's office. Any party to the protest or a Tribal member shall be entitled to receive a photocopy of said documents certified as true and correct copies by the Court Clerk upon payment to said clerk of the normal and customary charges.

Said certified copies shall be received as evidence by the Election Board in like manner as an original. Alternatively the Election Board, upon request of a party or on its own motion, may convene a hearing for any protested election at the Tribal Courthouse for the purpose of review of said election materials. After hearing the proofs and allegations of the contestants, the Election Board shall make their findings and shall have authority to pronounce their judgment either setting aside, or confirming the election.

Section 805. Request for Recount

Such request must be accompanied by a non-refundable cashier's check of two-hundred dollars (\$200.00) made payable to the Sac and Fox Nation. Said check shall be forwarded to the Tribal Secretary-Treasurer to be credited against the cost of the recount. The Election Board shall meet and decide within ten (10) days of receipt of the notice whether or not the reasons listed in the request are sufficient to cause a recount of ballots.

Office of Environmental Services Makes Testing Your Water Well Possible

For the past few years SFNOES has been providing rural water well testing for Sac and Fox Nation tribal members as part of the EPA funded Clean Water Act grant program. The name for this specific program under the CWA grant is called the Drinking Water Baseline Assessment. SFNOES will begin sampling in late June/early July and is looking for more participants. In some instances, testing is the only way to become aware of contaminants in your drinking water. If your drinking water does not come from a public water system, *you alone are responsible for assuring that your water is safe to drink.* The assessment includes testing for chemical, physiological, and bacteriological parameters. Please

understand that this is a great program, but Sac and Fox Nation does not have the authority to regulate private wells and is not responsible for, nor capable of, remediating wells containing high levels of contaminants. Should any participant's well water exceed safe drinking water standards, SFNOES will contact and work with the appropriate agency to assist you. Sac and Fox Nation Police Department Safety Tips from Tribal Police Chief, Bob Roberts

Safety tips, to offer effective counters, to being victimized, in random violent crime. Sac and Fox Tribal Police Chief Bob Roberts

We can now add to the list of victims the retired 77 yr. old TCU professor from Ft. Worth whose body was found last week in Oklahoma – and the 11 yr. old in Sarasota, FL. Because of these recent abductions in daylight hours, refresh yourself of these things to do in an emergency situation... This is for you, and for you to share with your wife, your children, everyone you know.

1. Use your elbow or your knees. If you are close enough to use it, do! However engaging in hand-to-hand combat with an attacker should be an option of last resort unless you are very well trained in self-defense.

2. If a robber asks for your wallet and/or purse, DO NOT HAND IT TO HIM, Toss it away from you...chances are that he is more interested in your wallet and/or purse than you, and he will go for the wallet/purse. RUN LIKE MAD IN THE OTHER DIRECTION!

3. If you are ever thrown into the trunk of a car, look for the glow-in-the-dark trunk release tab incorporated into some newer vehicles. Also, the back seats of many recent models fold down to accommodate the transport of larger items, so go deep in the trunk and push on the rear of the back seats to see if they open. If pushing fails, feel about on this area for knobs or levers that serve to latch the folding seat backs in place and work them.

4. Women have a tendency to get into their cars after shopping, eating, working, etc., and sit (doing their check-book, or making a list, etc.(DON'T DO

THIS!) The predator will be watching you, and this is the perfect opportunity for him to get in on the passenger side, put a gun to your head, and tell you where to go. AS SOON AS YOU GET IN YOUR CAR, LOCK THE DOORS AND LEAVE.

5. If someone is in the car with a gun to your head DO NOT DRIVE OFF, repeat: DO NOT DRIVE OFF! Instead gun the engine and speed into anything, wrecking the car. Your Air Bag will save you. If the person is in the back seat they will get the worst of it. As soon as the car crashes bail out and run. It is better than having the possible consequence. Another plan of action would be to drive him to a police station rather than to where he orders you to go, reminding him that if he shoots you, the car will veer out of control and hit something, which will injure or kill him too.

6. Always take the elevator instead of the stairs. (Stairwells are horrible places to be alone and the perfect crime spot. This is especially true at NIGHT!)

7. Women are more prone to be sympathetic: STOP. It may get you raped, or killed. Ted Bundy, the serial killer, was a good-looking, well educated man, who played on the sympathies of unsuspecting women. He walked with a cane, or a limp, and often asked "for help" into his vehicle or with his vehicle, which is when he abducted his next victim. Bundy also attacked in their homes while they were sleeping however it is not a mistake to keep in mind people aren't always what they appear to be and that someone who looks disabled or encumbered might well be entirely able-bodied.





From the Sauk Language Pilot Summer Youth Internship Program Participants:

The survival of the Sauk language depends on involving and engaging Sac and Fox tribal youth in learning and eventually teaching the language. The Sauk Language Pilot Summer Youth Internship Program was designed to provide an educational, fun, and intensive Sauk language experience over an eight week summer session.

One of the requirements of the application process for the Sauk Language Pilot Summer Youth Internship Program was to write a short paragraph on why being in the SLSYIP was important to the applicants. The 2013 participants had this to say: (spelling and grammar are from original applications, and printed with permission from the participants):

Tiller Bucktrot: "I would like to learn (learn) about the culture and history at Sac and Fox nation culture and langre (language) that is why I want this job."

Eddie Fullbright: "I am honored that I am allowed to help benefit my tribe, by being able to help keep the language alive. Learning the Sauk language allows people to get to know a bit of history of our great tribe. History is something that has always interested me. I feel I can do a Great job and I look forward to working with the Sauk Language Department."

Cody Morris: "I would like to learn Sauk language because I would be very interested in getting a degree in Tribal languages in college. I would also like to better my ability to speak and teach the language so that I can teach my friends and relatives to keep the language alive for our next generation."

Emily Nanaeto: "I wanted to become an intern because I wanted learn more

Sauk. The language is slowly fading away with few speakers. Language is apart of our cluture and if it dies out it'll be gone forever. I want to help keep the language and culture alive."

Harrison Spang: "Hello, my name is Harrison Spang I will be a ninth grader at Stroud high school next year. I would like to be an intern for the sauk language department. I enjoy learning sauk language and going to class. It is helping me to communicate better and work better in groups. I am glad sauk language is coming to my school and I want to be a part of it. Kaylon Wood: "Learning the Sauk language is important to me because I'm learning to keep my culture alive. When I was younger I can remember my grand-ma talking Indian and me not being able to talk back in Indian. Now, in the future I can understand and respond. When I speak it fluently I hope to teach others to understand."

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE WATER AND SEWER ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

The Indian Health Service, Office of Environmental Health and Engineering, offers programs to install water and sewer facilities to qualified Indian Homeowners. Funding and construction of sanitation facilities, such as wells, water service lines, septic tanks and drain fields, wastewater lagoons and sewer service lines, are available.

Minimum eligibility requirements include:

- Property must be located within the local Indian Health Service jurisdiction: The greater portion of Oklahoma County; Pottawatomie County north of the North Canadian River; Cleveland County west of the Indian Meridian; Lincoln County; Logan County, and a portion of southern Payne County.
- You must be a member of a federally recognized Indian tribe, band or group;
- If renting, you must obtain a lease agreement (minimum of five years) and a copy of the landowner's deed/title and CDIB. Property owner must possess a Certified Degree of Indian Blood (CDIB).
- HUD homes must be paid in full before services can be provided.

Documentation of tribal affiliation and home ownership or long-term lease will be required with the application for services. Mobile homes must be tied down, skirted and wheels removed prior to service.

Absentee Shawnee and Citizen Potawatomi Nation tribal members must apply for services through their tribal OEH offices.

Please note that applying for service does not guarantee you will receive service. Service depends on the availability of funding.

The Sac and Fox Nation will abide by these policies in keeping the Nation's swimming pool safe. Having complete and accurate records will be instrumental to the Sac and Fox Nation should any health or other concerns arise.

Seasonal Operation of Swimming Pool
The Sac and Fox Nation Swimming Pool shall be open from Memorial Day weekend thru Labor Day weekend.

Schedule of Days and Hours
The pool will be open Tuesday thru Sunday. Mondays will be closed for maintenance and treatment of pool.

Hours of operation for swimming are 1:00 PM to 7:00 PM Tuesday thru Sunday. Hours of Operation for Lifeguards 12:00 PM to 8:00 PM Tuesday thru Sunday

Private Parties

Evenings from 7:00 PM till 9:00 PM
Party is required to fill out proper paperwork for rental agreements as well as for scheduling. Arrangements will be administered through the Office of Government. Pool rental prohibited during the week of the Nation's annual celebration.

\$25.00 (2 hour) for Sac and Fox Nation tribal members Certified Lifeguards with CPR/First Aid training will be on duty. No waiving of fees. No exceptions.

Pool Rules

1. Bathers must take shower and remove excess body lotion before entering the pool
2. Persons with communicable diseases, open wounds, or bandages, must not enter pool

3. Animals are not allowed inside pool enclosure
4. Swimming alone is prohibited
5. Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult
6. Running or rough play is prohibited in and around pool
7. No glassware allowed in pool area
8. No food or drink allowed in pool
9. "Cut offs" if worn, must be hemmed
10. This pool has a bather load limit of 120 persons
11. No alcohol or tobacco allowed

Wading (Kiddy) Pool

Wading pool has a "no lifeguard on duty" sign posted. Each child will have to have a parent or guardian accompany them. No children over 12 years old allowed in wading pool.

5. On Dec 9, 2006, the Gov Council approved the purchase of land at Tanger Mall to build a casino, but nothing has been done! Why? The casino would have been paid off by now! The Secretary has made no move to uphold our action!!!!

TRIBAL EDUCATION (RAP) PROGRAMS

The Sac and Fox Nation Education Department would like to make all tribal members aware of the programs we offer. These programs are funded with Revenue Allocation Plan funds and are available to Sac and Fox Nation tribal members only. All awards are based on the availability of funds.

School Clothing/Supplies Grant

Funds are provided to assist Sac and Fox Nation school-aged (Pre-K through 12th grade) tribal members in obtaining adequate and appropriate school clothing and school supplies. Each eligible student will receive a check in the amount of \$200.00 for clothing and \$50.00 for school supplies until funds are depleted. Applicants may only apply one time per school year. Funding is on a first-come, first-served basis. Applications may be turned in beginning June 1st until September 10th, 2013, or until funds are depleted.

8th Grade Incentive

Funds are provided to encourage Sac and Fox Nation tribal members to complete their education and to strive for excellence. All Sac and Fox Nation tribal members who have successfully completed the 8th grade in the current year are eligible to apply and will receive \$100.00 in incentive funds. Verification of completion must accompany application. Applications will be accepted until funding is depleted.

12th Grade/GED Incentive

Funds are provided to encourage Sac and Fox Nation tribal members to complete their education and to strive for excellence. All Sac and Fox Nation tribal members who have successfully completed the 12th grade or who have successfully obtained their GED in the current year are eligible to apply and will receive \$200.00 in incentive funds. Verification of completion must accompany the application. Funding is on a first-come, first-served basis, and will continue until funds are depleted.

12th Grade Graduation Grant

Funds are provided to assist Sac and Fox Nation high school senior tribal members to acquire the following: class ring, senior pictures, graduation cap and gown, and graduation announcements. All Sac and Fox Nation tribal members who are currently enrolled in the 12th grade may participate in this program. Each eligible student may receive up to \$500.00 in assistance, with the completed application and the vendor's invoice submitted. The funds will be paid directly to the vendors. Funding is on a first-come, first-served basis, until funds are depleted.

Degree/Certification Incentive

Funds are provided to encourage Sac and Fox Nation tribal members to complete their education and to strive for excellence. All Sac and Fox Nation tribal members who have successfully completed a post-secondary degree or adult vocational training certification in the current year may participate in this program. Incentive funds in the amount of \$1,000.00 will be awarded for post-secondary degrees and incentive funds in the amount of \$750.00 will be awarded for adult vocational training certifications.

The Day The Dollar Dies

December 6, 2015, 3 p.m. HKT, Hong Kong

Twenty-one men representing China’s most powerful institutions file into a conference room atop the ICC Tower looming over Victoria Harbor. The Politburo Standing Committee has mustered the CEOs of China’s four largest banks, Sinopec, and several other state-owned multinationals, plus officers from the Central Military Commission and a pair of academics from China’s top technology universities.

The general secretary formally opens the meeting. “As you know, the United States of America continues to manipulate its currency,” he begins. “It is devaluing its dollar, which steals away trade and reduces the value of its debts. The Standing Committee manages the yuan’s value to protect our manufacturing base and support employment.”

The secretary leans back ever so slightly to say what everyone in the room already knows, and the reason why they are here. “Three days ago, the Federal Reserve System announced its sixth quantitative easing policy in the past seven years.”

And now, the marching orders.
“The Central Politburo Standing Committee of the Communist Party has agreed that it is time to use every financial measure of the People’s Republic to preserve the state of its economy. It has approved liquidating the government’s holdings of U.S. treasuries.”

The order from the stone-faced secretary sounds broad, even bland. But it means very specific, very powerful things to each man in this room. It means pulling the trigger on a huge number of massive initiatives. And it’s backed by more than a trillion dollars.

The Chinese economy will suffer some collateral damage as well, but the decision has finally been made. To encourage and to enforce the point, the secretary concludes with a proverb: “Good medicine tastes bitter.”

He could’ve used a different one: “Wait long, strike fast.”

December 7, 9 a.m. EST, New York
It’s a normal day on Wall Street. Markets are up after last week’s Fed announcement of QE6. Thanks to this latest round of money-printing, gold is holding at \$2,000 per ounce, oil is \$95 per barrel. The dollar index is steady at 82.

Squawk Box is running a story saying China’s new East Asian free-trade zone seems to have been fast-tracked. Mongolia, Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand and China’s recently reincorporated province of Taiwan are all sending signals that they’re suddenly ready to sign up. Trade will be conducted in Chinese renminbi. An Associated Press story getting some play quotes an unnamed official from Japan’s Ministry of Finance saying that since most of Japan’s trade is now with China, it too will eventually be forced to join the East Asian Prosperity Cooperation. Even Australia is considering participation. The markets yawn.

10 a.m. EST

The Dow Jones Industrial Average hits 16,000—a new record. Gold bumps up \$20 per ounce. The dollar index is showing strength. Market Makers is praising Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke’s masterful handling of the economy, despite stubbornly high

unemployment numbers. The lower third is flashing bulletins about surprise resource acquisitions and land deals across Africa and Central Asia by some Chinese state-owned oil and mining giants. Stuart Varney’s show devotes a 30-second chuckle to “irrational Chinese exuberance.”

10:48 a.m. EST, Beijing

Chinese Central Bank governor Zhou Xiaochuan is on television, announcing that China can no longer afford the Fed’s aggressive money-printing. “It has become evident that with America’s stagnant economy and aging population, it will not be able to pay its debts. It is defaulting on its debts by using inflation. China has lent America more than \$2 trillion. The People’s Bank of China has no choice but to stop purchasing treasuries. We have spoken our concerns for several years, but the Fed has ignored its largest creditor. We are cutting off the credit card.”

10:56 a.m. EST, New York Stock Exchange

The markets reverse sharply. Dow futures plunge 1,200 points. Gold, silver and oil fall as investors impulsively rush for cash. Treasury yields skyrocket. Within seven minutes, the frenzy triggers preprogrammed fail-safes. Trading halts temporarily. But in Tokyo, Singapore and New Delhi, they’re still trading. American traders call for calm, saying that a full-on dump of China’s U.S. treasury stockpile would be “mutually assured destruction.”

Thirty minutes later, trading resumes—with an eerie calm.

11:44 a.m. EST, Moscow

As markets settle into an uneasy wait-and-see, Russian President Vladimir Putin appears at an unscheduled press conference. Holding up a gold coin, he announces that the Central Bank of Russia completed the largest bullion transfer in modern history in October: 850 metric tons from the International Monetary Fund. “Russia would like to thank the United States, Canada and Great Britain for approving this historic purchase of their gold holdings. In this age of unrestrained electronic money printing and currency devaluations, it is the opinion of the central bank that physical gold bullion remains a critical component for national wealth and power.”

Putin then throws down this challenge: “The gold is here for anyone to audit. I suggest that investors follow Russia’s example and demand an independent audit of Fort Knox.”

With this shock announcement, Russia becomes the world’s third-largest holder of gold after the European Union and China. Putin adds that Moscow is also negotiating for entry into the East Asian Prosperity Cooperation and, starting in January, will use the Chinese yuan for international currency transactions—with the notable exception of oil and gas exports to Europe, which will now be priced in euro marks.

Putin’s ITAR-TASS transcript goes viral. Twitter and Facebook explode.

To Wall Street and the world, it is now clear that something momentous is happening. It looks like a pre-planned attack on America’s anemic economy. Before Putin finishes his announcement, investors erupt in sell orders. The Dow plunges 30 percent in nine minutes.

When refills are needed and the patient has less than 25% of medicine left, the patient or representative can bring a list of prescriptions wanted to the pharmacy or call on the refill line. The patient must be specific on which medications they are requesting to be refilled. Requests like “all of my medications” or “what I got last time” are not very precise and if used, the Pharmacy staff cannot be sure what is being requested. If such terminology is used, the patient is responsible for checking the medicine when it is picked up to see if the refill is complete. The patient or representative may bring or fax a list using prescription numbers or drug names to the pharmacy or bring the bottles of the medication to be refilled.

Patients that are out of medication for chronic medical conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, etc. can obtain refills until their next appointment as long as the following criteria are met:

- The patient has received the medication within the last 90 days.
- It is the first time the patient has

rescheduled/missed as appointment.

Pharmacy is only allowed to give a “refill to appointment” once. If the patient reschedules a second time, they will have to sign in as a “work-in” and their records must be reviewed by the nurse/provider.

Each prescription label has a days supply indicated. Prescriptions may not be refilled sooner than 75% of the days supply.

Refills called in on the refill line should be given 48 hours before being picked up. As the number of prescriptions increases, the pharmacy will require a 48 hour wait time for all refills (whether brought to the pharmacy or called in).

Prescriptions written by a consultant physician (and the patient was referred to that physician by a provider from this facility) may be filled if the medicine is normally stocked in this pharmacy or the drug may be substituted with a similar medication with consent of the referring provider. If medication cannot be provided, the patient will be informed and advised to purchase the medication.

Dear Chief Thurman:

This is to let the Business Committee know that I will propose that Governing Council clarify our intention regarding two Constitutional enrollment issues:

1. requiring a parent on the roll and
2. definition of Sac and Fox Nation as Oklahoma Sauk

The purpose for my proposed resolution will be to show that it was not the intention of Council to create eligibility for applicants without a parent on the roll when we adopted this Constitution in 1987 and not the intention of Council to enroll applicants with less than 1/8 degree of Sac and Fox of Oklahoma blood.

My proposed resolution will also include:

- an immediate halt to processing applicants without a parent on the roll, and
- improve enrollment record keeping to show Sac and Fox of Oklahoma blood quantum separately instead of combined with Nemaha and Mesquakie blood as it is now and
- notification to those members without a parent on the roll or with less than 1/8 degree of Sac and Fox of Oklahoma blood that Council has clarified those eligibility requirements, that no one will be removed even though they were improperly enrolled, and offer him or her an opportunity to relinquish.

My only request of the B.C. is a count of how many members have been enrolled without a parent on the roll and how many members have been enrolled with less than 1/8 Sac and Fox of Oklahoma blood since you first took office (since you are the longest serving B.C. member). I look forward to hearing from you soon.

As always I am available to answer any questions you may have.

The Sauk Interns are also given opportunities each afternoon to participate in other tribal governmental department activities. Recently the Sauk Language Department/Sauk Language Master Apprenticeship Program was awarded the title of "National Success Story" by the Administration for Native Americans. While receiving this title was a very satisfying honor, it is just the beginning for the revitalization of the Sauk language. It has long been a fact that the survival of the Sauk can only be achieved by involving our tribal youth in the learning and eventual teaching of the Sauk language. Beginning through enrollment of students in the high school Sauk language courses, participating in the Summer Youth Internship Program, and eventually successfully completing the Tribal Languages program for Native Language Learning and Teaching at

Bacone College, the Sauk Language Department has designed a three-level program for the revitalization of the Sauk language. With support and encouragement from the Sac and Fox community to the young people of the Nation, this program will be a success, and Sauk language will once more be the vibrant, living language of the Sauk people.

We would like to extend our thanks to the parents and families of the students of the Youth Internship Program for allowing us the opportunity to spend the summer with your high school students. This is a great group of smart and ambitious students, and we encourage you as parents to continue to encourage these teenagers to learn their language, do well in school, and become the next generation of educated Sauk language instructors and tribal leaders.





