

Oklahoma City Indian Clinic to host 10th Annual Red Feather Gala

US Representative Tom Cole to be honored with Spirit of the Urban Indian Award

OKLAHOMACITY—Oklahoma City Indian Clinic's 10th Annual Red Feather Gala will be held from 5 to 9 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 1 in the Great Banking Hall of the First National Center, 120 North Robinson. The gala will raise funds for OKCIC's CARES Capital Campaign to expand the clinic's pharmacy and will feature live and silent auctions, live painting and traditional tribal dancing.

Currently, OKCIC's pharmacy staff fills more than 200,000 prescriptions in its 900-square-foot workplace. To serve more patients, the clinic is continuing to raise funds for a new 7,000-square-foot pharmacy that will give staff the capacity to fill more than 400,000 prescriptions a year, hold education seminars, provide confidential patient consultation and add convenience with a pharmacy drive-through.

"This year's Red Feather Gala will be a celebration of Oklahoma City Indian Clinic's 40 years of service to the community," said Robyn Sunday-Allen, CEO of OKCIC. "Our patient base has grown tremendously over the past 40 years, and we look forward to expanding our pharmacy, so that we can continue to provide excellent care to our more than 18,000 patients."

U.S. Representative Tom Cole will be honored with the Spirit of the Urban Indian Award. As a member of the Chicka-

saw Nation and one of the only tribal-enrolled American Indians currently serving in Congress, Rep. Cole has been committed to serving American Indians in Oklahoma and across the nation.

Over the course of the evening, internationally known Native American artists Bunky Echo-Hawk, Brent Greenwood and Antonia Belindo will participate in a live painting exhibition. All guests in attendance will also have the opportunity to participate in a Native American Friendship Dance.

Sequoyah National Research Center Exhibit on Native American Stereotypes

The University of Arkansas at Little Rock's Sequoyah National Research Center (SNRC) will open the exhibit, "Toy Tips and Totem Poles: Native American Stereotypes in the Lives of Children," in the Dr. J.W. Wiggins Native American Art Gallery on Friday, September 5 at 5:30pm.

The exhibit will be drawn from the Hirschfelder-Molin Native American Stereotypes Collection, a collection of over 1500 museum objects and archival documents donated to SNRC in 2012 by Arlene Hirschfelder and Paulette Molin, professional educators and authors with decades-long experience in Native American education and Native American studies. It is thought that this may be the largest such collection in the world. SNRC's archivist Erin Fehr will be curating the exhibit with Hirschfelder, Molin, and SNRC staff.

The exhibit will highlight the areas of the collection dealing with children and the stereotypes of Native Americans that are omnipresent in the lives of American children. By examining childhood objects – dolls, toys, books, games, cloth-

ing, sports memorabilia – it is our intent that awareness of the inculcation of the images and their associations will bring attention to the difficulty of changing mainstream American thinking about Native stereotypes. In addition to presenting the stereotypes themselves, positive images and responses from Native people will be presented as an alternative to the stereotypes. The purpose of this exhibit is to create awareness of the variety of Native cultures and educate the public on the achievements of contemporary American Indians and Alaska Natives.

UALR's Sequoyah National Research Center is dedicated to the collection and preservation of all forms of Native American expression. Located on the extreme southern end of the UALR campus in the University Plaza, SNRC has served as an archive for Native Americans for over 30 years. The gallery is open Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; the exhibit will run through December 19, 2014.
