

SCHOOL SERVICES - GOVERNING COUNCIL & INDIAN COUNTRY

CHIEF'S ADDRESS TO THE NATION

September 2, 2010
Trubal Members:

Aho! I will be covering two topics this month and sharing information from the national scene in Indian Country.

School Clothing - Supplies Services

Our tribal youth have started back to school for this new term, which resulted in a rush to get school clothing and school supply applications filled out by school officials and parents/guardians. The enormous work load (845 students funded) for our tribal government staff resulted in phone messages of up to 70-90 calls per day, which were returned in addition to the processing of applications, many of which were not properly filled out. Documentation that was required in accompanying the applications were lacking with a large number of applications resulting in them being delayed of processing until the responsible party provided this information. Staff made the weekly purchase of gift cards and these were mailed with supporting letters letting the merchants know that there was no sales tax to be administered with these purchases. As this service for our tribal youth was being administered and is still ongoing, many of the youth had to wait for their gift cards. We realize the short turnaround, often just one week, of when school officials are in their respective offices to certify that the student is enrolled and to fill out their portion of the application so it can be returned to our tribal offices and the processing of this huge volume of applications once received. My sincerest apologies to those who had to wait and I assure our tribal membership that we are looking at streamlining the process of administering this service in the future. My point is to inform you of the total process of this service plus to ask your cooperation in the future, not only concerning our tribal students, but whenever you contact our governmental staff concerning other services. We expect professionalism on your part as well as our staff so please be courteous on the telephone and conduct yourself as to how you would wish to be addressed if you were in the staff's position.

Governing Council / August 28, 2010

We established a quorum at 10:20 a.m. and I truly thank each tribal member that attended and stayed for the duration, recessing at 5:20 p.m. The agenda was amended resulting in twelve items being added. *The Minutes of one Annual and two Special Governing Council Meetings were set aside. *Old Business consisting of a RAP Investment Policy will be addressed at the RAP Council possibly in October. *New Business agenda items pertaining to reconfirmation and confirmation of judges/justices was accomplished with the following results: District Judges - Judge Darrell Dowty was reconfirmed and 4 new judges were confirmed: John D. Douthitt; Darel R. Matlock,

Jr.; Michael Colbert Smith; and Charles G. Tate, resulting in the total of 5 District judges. Supreme Court Justices - Justice Timothy Posey was reconfirmed and 2 new justices were confirmed: Joe C. Taylor and O. Joseph Williams resulting in 5 Supreme Court Justices. Two Justices terms have not expired and are still serving: Larry K. Lenora and Barbara Dakin.

I had called for a Special Governing Council for May 22, 2010 of which we did not establish a quorum resulting in having to take care of this very important and needed item of business at this Annual Council, three months later. Our tribal court was in dire need of the additional judges/justices. This portion of the meeting lasted approximately 1 1/2 hours with questions of each applicant, after which voting took place. The rest of the New Business agenda items followed: *Claims Report and Budget was tabled until the next

called Governing Council. *Investor Advocates Presentation was next with Terri Webber in attendance to answer questions and explain why their services were obtained by the Business Committee. *The twelve added agenda items were next with only three of the twelve addressed and then the tribal membership wished to recess. *The Annual Reports consisting of Secretary's Report; Treasurer's Report; Tribal Attorney's Report; Program/Department Reports; and Committee/Commission/Board Reports were not addressed due to recessing the meeting.

Tribal members, as you can see from the business taken care of on this day, the reason why an agenda is set and needs to be adhered to is so we do not have to reconvene or have another separate day to finish the agenda! I have proposed Informational Meetings to be held at least quarterly to address your concerns thus not having to amend the Governing Council agendas to address items that end up taking so much time to discuss.

Breaking News in Indian Country
The following was taken from the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) legislative broadcast of August 26, 2010.
Update on Major Legislative Issues
After a busy July session that included the passage of the Tribal Law and Order Act, Congress has recessed for its traditional August vacation. Members of Congress will be in their home

districts until mid-September, and this is a good time to meet face-to-face with your Senators and Representative. The following is a brief summary of major Indian issues pending before Congress that NCAI believes are likely to be considered this fall. We urge tribal leaders to discuss these priorities with Members of Congress and ask for their support.

Carcieri "Fix" Update - Ask Congress to Pass this Year
Because of tribal leaders' efforts before, during and after the "Carcieri Summit" in Washington, DC on July 13th, the Carcieri "fix" legislation has new momentum. Since the summit, there have been new cosponsors on both the House and Senate versions of the legislation (H.R. 3697, H.R. 3742 and S. 1703). Additionally, on a unanimous vote, the Carcieri legislation was included at the House Appropriations Subcommittee level in the FY 2011 Interior appropriations bill.

With all of this progress, the united effort to move the bill forward will draw the attention of opponents to this legislation. We must maintain our efforts through to the end of the Congress to pass the legislation. We cannot count on the Interior appropriations bill going through, and must ask our Senators and Representatives to look widely at other bills that may move, including the omnibus appropriations bill expected sometime in the fall. We seek to have the Carcieri "fix" pass because it is the right thing to do and it will prevent chaos in determining trust land status.

During the August recess, please reach out to Members of Congress and remind them of the importance of passing the "fix" this year. The legislation gained its momentum by virtue of direct contact by tribal leadership. It is important that we maintain this level of urgency and activity all the way through to the end of the year. Read the Carcieri Talking Points and NCAI Testimony.

Cobell Settlement Legislation Debated in Senate - Ask Congress to Pass in September
Before the August recess, the Senate debated two bills to settle the Cobell class action litigation over accounting for individual Indian trust funds. Senator Byron Dorgan, Chair of the Indian Affairs Committee, offered an amendment to H.R. 4994 for unanimous consent, which included the legislation requested by the Plaintiffs and the Administration. Senator John Barrasso, Vice Chair of the Indian Affairs Committee, offered S. 3754 for unanimous consent, similar legislation with a few key differences. Each Senator objected to the other's bill, so the legislation did not proceed. Senator Dorgan expressed frustration over the delays in approving the settlement; however, there are some signs of progress, including the development of offsets to pay for the settlement.

AARP HONORS ELDERS

Sac and Fox tribal members John R. "Jack" Thorpe and Stella Nullake Nanaeto received AARP Indian Elders Honors medals at the second annual awards ceremony held at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City on Monday, August 30, 2010.

Fifty elders representing each of the 38 Indian nations in Oklahoma were honored.

The Indian Elder Honors began as a way to recognize unsung heroes and also to increase relationships with Indian people and tribes, said Craig E. Davis, Associate State Director at AARP Oklahoma. Anyone can nominate an eligible elder. The nomination

"The extraordinary accomplishments of Indian elders from all parts of the state have left an indelible mark on their families, their tribes, their communities and the state as a whole," said AARP Oklahoma Volunteer State President Marjorie Lyons in a press release from AARP Oklahoma. "Whether they served their tribes in a leadership position, devoted themselves to cultural preservation or were simply a quiet source of strength to their family, this group of honorees embodies the qualities

criteria stipulate that nominees must be over 50, a member of a federally recognized Oklahoma tribe, and living. An anonymous selection committee then chooses the 50 honorees for the year. The honored elders receive silver medals that feature the AARP logo and the words "2010 AARP Indian Elder Honors".


FORMER TRIBAL PRINCESS CHALLENGES NEW ROYALTY

A LIVING HERITAGE: SAC & FOX WORK TO PRESERVE LANGUAGE

The Language Departments of the Thakiwa and Meskwaki met in Tama, Iowa for the historic first of their continuing collaborations on August 11-15, 2010. Sac and Fox Nation Language Director Jacob Manatowa-Bailey, Sauk speakers Henrietta Massey, Christine Williamson, and Maxine Cobb, teacher Orvena “Twiggy” Gregory, and intern Mosiah Bluecloud traveled to the Meskwaki settlement to visit with Johnathon Buffalo, Historic Preservation Officer, and Yolanda Pushetonequa, Language Preservation Officer, of the Sac and Fox Tribe of the Mississippi in Iowa.

“The Meskwaki Nation is in the initial stage of planning and implementing a Meskwaki Cultural Preservation Program with a focus on the Meskwaki language,” said Manatowa-Bailey. “The trip allowed the Sauk Language Department to discuss and share resources regarding language preservation and revitalization with the Meskwaki Nation. We’re excited to learn what we can from each other as we develop a mutually beneficial partnership between Sauk and Meskwaki people concerning language.”

The Sac and Fox Nation Business Committee took action to formally create a Sauk Language Department in 2005 and provided funding for it in 2007 after several previous endeavors over the years that included the formation of a Sauk Language Working Group and classes taught by individuals.

The Meskwaki Nation Tribal Council

allocated funds for language preservation under the Historic Preservation Office in 2008.

The trip also provided ample opportunity for the Sauk Language representatives to interact with many tribal elders, workers, and community members not only of the Meskwaki Nation of Iowa but also the Kickapoo Tribe of Texas whose language is closely related.

The Cultural Survival organization based in Cambridge, Massachusetts provided funding for the trip. The Sac and Fox Nation Sauk Language Department is one of four language programs partnered with Cultural Survival and the National Alliance to Save Native Languages and is featured on the Cultural Survival website at www.culturalsurvival.org.

Cultural Survival states on its website, “Whole concepts, relationships, understandings, perspectives, and information are contained in a language, things that cannot be replicated or translated. An entire aspect of humanity, developed over thousands of years, goes with it. [...] Our program is giving tribes the resources they need to [...] teach their language to their children, to keep it a living heritage.”

Arlan Manatowa, Sauk Language Curriculum Production Specialist, attended the meeting at the request of the Sac and Fox Nation Historic Preservation Office and provided photographic documentation of the historic event.

Sauk is a very visual and descriptive language. Many words for modern things have their origins in the natural world. For example, **wâthênikani** is the Sauk word for a lamp. The literal translation would be something like “object that makes light.” **Wâthê-** refers to light and **-nikani** converts it to an object state.

GIFT TO THE TRIBE BY BRITISH BARON

(Story and photo by Suzanne Wanatee, Meskwaki Nation)

Johnathan Buffalo, Meskwaki Historical Preservation Director, traveled to Iowa City on April 15, 2010 to meet with Lord Richard Lyon-Dalberg-Acton, Baron Acton of Bridgnorth of the House of Lords of the British Parliament, to receive an item he donated to the Tribe. Lord Acton presented a hand-colored George Catlin American Indian print of a Sauki warrior, purchased in London. They met at the State Historical Society of Iowa building where Lord Acton presented Johnathan with the print and they exchanged stories of past remembrance of the relationship and friendship between Britain and the Tribe. Johnathan thanked him on behalf of the Tribe, and asked him to take a message back to England, that the Tribe

still remembers the British people as friends. Lord Acton reciprocated the same message to relay to the Tribe, that Britain still remembers the Meskwaki people as friends. Johnathan then presented him with a beaded medallion necklace made by Nadine Big Bear, which Lord Acton was very happy to receive, saying he wasn't expecting anything in return. He also said he would very much like to one day come and see the Tribe's museum.

Lord Acton divides his time between residences in London and Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He is married to Patricia Acton, a professor at the University of Iowa College of Law in Iowa City.

The print entitled “Nah-Pope (The Soup) A Sac Warrior” is an original antique George

Catlin print with original hand color applied at the time of publication. The print measures 5.5” x 9.5”, is beautifully preserved and in excellent condition, and is from an 1855 edition of a book called “The Natural History of Man” written by James Prichard which was originally published in London in 1842.

George Catlin journeyed around the United States in the 1830's to paint the Indians and their way of life, convinced that westward expansion spelled certain disaster for native peoples. Catlin was the first artist to record the Plains Indians in their own territories, and he created a collection of over 500 paintings called “Indian Gallery”. In the time period immediately following the Indian Removal Act, he witnessed firsthand the devastation of many tribes and he came to regard the frontier as a region of corruption. He portrayed the nobility of Indian peoples, but he was aware that he painted in the twilight of passing time and his collection reveals the fateful encounter of two different cultures in a frontier region undergoing dramatic transformation. Catlin displayed his works in U.S. cities and capitals and in Europe and became a strong advocate for valuing the Indian's way of life. He dedicated his life to this and throughout his career hoped Congress would purchase the Indian Gallery as a legacy for future generations. Congress did not and Catlin fell into bankruptcy. After Catlin's death in 1872, a private purchaser donated the paintings to the Smithsonian where they are recognized today as one of the great cultural treasures of the United States, offering rare insight into native cultures and a crucial chapter in American history. And now, through the thoughtfulness and generosity of Lord Richard Lyon-Dalberg-Acton and his wife Patricia, the Meskwaki Nation has a Catlin print of its own that can be displayed in the Tribe's own museum.

NEW ID REQUIREMENTS FOR SOME DRUGS

We have been informed by the Oklahoma Board of Pharmacy that new identification requirements are being put into place for patients receiving controlled substances prescribed by a physician or other healthcare provider.

Examples of these medications include but are not limited to Tylenol #3, Darvocet, temazepam, Lyrica, Ambien, pseudoephedrine (Sudafed), and Tramadol.

Acceptable forms of identification include the following: a valid state driver's license, a valid state identification card (red card), a valid military identification card as well as a valid passport or passport card. Please bring one of these acceptable identification cards with you if you have been prescribed this type of medication.



POSSIBLE INDIVIDUAL TAX LIABILITY

Under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act (IGRA), net revenues from Class II or Class III gaming activities conducted or licensed by an Indian tribe may be used to make per capita payments to members of the tribe only if four conditions are met. Condition 4 states: The per capita payments are subject to federal taxation and the tribe must notify members of such tax liability when payments are made.

The Social Security number of all payees should be secured prior to making payments. Otherwise, the tribe is potentially liable for backup withholding provisions pursuant to IRC section 3406. (Source: Internal Revenue Service's (IRS) Gaming Tax Law and Bank Secrecy Act Issues for Indian Tribal Governments)

Per Capita payments are subject to federal taxation and require the Sac and Fox Nation to prepare IRS Form 1099-MISC, Statement for Recipients of Miscellaneous Income when payment is made to the tribal member. (Source: National Indian Gaming Commission's Frequently Asked Questions).

Other Income, i.e. Per Capita Payment may make impact your tax reporting; it could also affect any State and/or Federal Benefits you may receive or programs in which you participate. The Sac and Fox Nation encourages you to check with your tax accountant and/or benefit specialist.

Some of her many duties include serving as co-liaison for the Sac and Fox Veterans Organization, The Black Hawk Health Clinic's Advisory Board, the Social Services Department, the Elders Committee/Title XI, the Language Department, the Sac and Fox Public Library, NAGPRA/Repatriation Department, the USDA, the Rodeo Committee, the Activity Committee, the Employee Committee, and the IRR Program. She has participated in parades with veterans, attended many pow-wows and traveled to historic sites with the Historic Preservation Director. Before being elected, Stella retired with 35 years of service for Kerr-McGee Corporation and CITGO Petroleum Company. Stella is a traditional person and believes in the teachings of the older ways of the Sac and Fox. She believes strongly in preserving the language and retaining tribal religious ceremonies and takes an active part in these ceremonies.

In addition, she is very creative at making traditional clothing and dance regalia for her children, grandchildren and other family members.

John R. "Jack" Thorpe Former Principal Chief of the Sac and Fox Nation, Jack learned leadership early in his life from his father – legendary athlete and Olympian Jim Thorpe – who impressed upon him the importance of tribal and cultural preservation and to never forget where he came from. Before election as Chief, he was a member of the Board of Commissioners for the Housing Authority later serving a combined 30 years as Executive Director of the Housing Authority of the Sac and Fox Nation, Housing Authority of the Absentee Shawnee Tribe, Housing Authority of the Kickapoo Tribe of Oklahoma and Housing Authority of the Kickapoo Tribe of Kansas. During his term of office, Jack contributed to the establishment of the Sac and Fox Nation Code of Laws. From the code of laws came the establishment of the Sac and Fox District Court system, Sac and Fox Tribal Police system, Sac and Fox Tribal Taxation system and the establishment of the first tribal vehicle license

remain the same: \$1.4 billion dollars for settlement of accounting and mismanagement claims and \$2 billion for addressing fractionation of individual Indian land. Senator Barrasso's bill includes the following key differences:

- **Land Consolidation Funds.** Senator Barrasso's bill directs the Secretary to consult with tribes in selecting the tracts of land for consolidation and would permit tribal governments to contract or compact the land consolidation program.
- **Adjustments to Natural Resources Mismanagement Class.** Senator Barrasso's bill would set aside \$50 million to permit equitable adjustments for class members who may not be fairly compensated under the formula.
- **Qualifications of Bank.** Senator Barrasso's bill permits the court to examine the qualifications of the bank that will perform the distribution.
- **Contemporaneous Time Records Required for Attorneys Fees.** Senator Barrasso dropped his request for a cap on attorneys' fees, and instead focused on the side agreement which contemplates attorneys' fees between \$50 and \$100 million. The side agreement would require plaintiffs' attorneys to file contemporaneous billing records "where available." Senator Barrasso's bill would require plaintiffs to submit contemporaneous billing records in all instances.

The two bills also reflect how deficit concerns are driving the agenda in Congress this year. Senator Dorgan's bill would pay for the settlement by tapping into the Highway Trust Fund which is funded by gasoline taxes. Senator Barrasso's bill would offset the spending by using

unspent Recovery Act funds. Currently congressional staff is seeking the necessary offsets to pay for the legislation. The settlement has been stopped in the Senate on three prior occasions when it was included in larger spending packages because of concerns on spending and offsets.

NCAI passed a resolution at the Midyear in Rapid City that reflects both Senator Dorgan's push for immediate passage and Senator Barrasso's concerns about some of the details of the settlement. With the relatively narrow differences in the legislation, it seems likely that the legislation will be considered in September when Congress returns.

Law Enforcement Funding - Key Year for Increases

The passage of the Tribal Law and Order Act creates momentum for improving law enforcement on Indian reservations, but this effort cannot succeed without adequate funding. There is a significant opportunity for increased appropriations this year, but tribal leaders must voice their support with Congress. For FY2011, the Department of Justice (DOJ) requested a total of \$448.8 million for public safety initiatives in tribal communities, a 59% increase over the DOJ's FY 2010 funding levels for tribal specific programs. The Department proposes new bill language that would designate a 7% tribal set-aside (\$139.5 million) from all discretionary Office of Justice Programs (OJP) programs for tribal criminal justice assistance. The Administration requested a total of \$67 million for tribes under the COPS program to fund tribal law enforcement expenses. An additional \$47.9 million would go to the Office of Violence Against Women aimed at addressing the high victimization rates of American Indian and Alaska Native victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking on tribal lands. The House Commerce/Justice/

Science (CJS) Appropriations Subcommittee has indicated that it does not completely accept the Administration's proposal, but will provide an additional \$117 million for a total of \$342 million. The Senate CJS Appropriations Subcommittee did not accept the Administration's proposed increases. These large differences between the House and Senate intentions create the need for tribal leaders to weigh in.

It appears likely that Congress will not complete the appropriations process this year through the regular process, but will return after the election to pass an omnibus appropriations bill. This means that there is a great opportunity for tribal leaders to advocate for the increased funding levels in the President's budget, or at least the increases supported in the House. It is all the more critical that law enforcement is increased this year, because it is expected that budgets will get even tighter in future years.

Support the Indian Energy Parity Act and Related Bills to Streamline Leasing and Support Economic Development

On August 5, Senators Dorgan, Johnson, Thune, Tester, Tom Udall, and Franken introduced S. 3752, legislation which would amend the Energy Policy Act of 1992 and other statutes to streamline Indian energy development, and enhance programs to support Indian energy development and efficiency. The Indian Energy Parity Act of 2010 was referred to the Senate Indian Affairs Committee. The Indian Energy Parity Act contains critical provisions that will provide tribes fair and equitable opportunities to develop these energy resources, move the nation towards energy independence, create jobs, and develop clean energy.

Among the provisions of the measure are those which would expedite or revise federal permitting, leasing and appraisal processes, including amendments to the Indian Land Consolidation Act; authorize the Secretary of the Interior to establish demonstration projects through which Indian tribes would integrate and coordinate energy

funding from various federal agencies into a single integrated program; improve tribal access to the transmission grid; provide an allocation to tribes of funding to states under the Department of Energy's (DOE) energy efficiency program and authorize direct grants to tribes under DOE's weatherization program; and authorize the Secretary of Energy to develop a program and provide loan guarantees to Indian tribes for energy development. Additional provisions to facilitate the financing of energy projects on tribal lands are expected to be included in a separate bill, an Indian energy tax package, which may be introduced in the Senate when Congress returns in mid-September from the August recess.

In addition, both the House and the Senate are developing versions of the Helping Expedite and Advance Responsible Tribal Homeownership Act (HEARTH Act, H.R. 2523 and S. 3235). The bill would amend the Indian Long Term Leasing Act (25 U.S.C. 415) to make the Navajo Leasing Act open to all tribes, allowing all tribal governments to approve trust land leases and submit them directly to the Secretary of the Interior under approved tribal regulations. The HEARTH Act would eliminate obstacles to leasing and economic development in Indian country.

Tribal Land and Water Legislation

A number of tribes have pending legislation for land transfers and exchanges, and for settlement of water rights. For example, the House of Representatives has passed the Hoh Lands Bill (H.R. 1061). The legislation transfers a small strip of National Park Service land to the BIA to be held in trust for the Hoh Tribe, and transfers other contiguous tribally owned lands into trust. The land transfer is necessary to allow the Hoh Tribe to move out of a flood and tsunami zone that is unfit for safe habitation. The Hoh Lands bill is supported by NCAI Resolution REN-08-031. In addition, the House has passed several tribal water rights settlements, including H.R. 1065 (White Mountain Apache), H.R.

3254 (Taos Pueblo), and H.R. 3342 (Pueblos of Nambe, Pojoaque, San Ildefonso, and Tesuque.) Each of these bills would resolve decades-long Indian water rights litigation for these Indian tribes, the United States, and other parties and would result in critical water infrastructure being developed to serve water users in Indian and non-Indian communities.

Native Vote 2010

Congress pays attention when Indian Country votes! Native Vote 2010 is a nonpartisan campaign designed to encourage American Indian and Alaska Native people to exercise their right to vote. Although this year is a midterm election, 88 percent of the Congress is up for reelection. Many of these tight races will occur in Indian Country, and NCAI is encouraging Native people to inform themselves and vote. Native Vote is encouraging tribal leaders across the country to identify a Native Vote coordinator to work with NCAI to mobilize voters in Indian Country. Native Vote will be providing toolkits, promotional items, and updating the Native Vote webpage to reflect this year's midterm elections. In addition, NCAI will be hosting telephone conferences and webinars with Native Vote coordinators and tribal representatives.

SAC & FOX HONOR GUARD TO ACCEPT ONLY MILITARY VETERANS



The Tribal Vets organization feels we met the rain and wind and weather at this year's 2010 pow-wow. Despite absences due to illness, the Honor Guard posted and retrieved flags and honored the families of our tribal warriors. Members gourd danced both afternoon sessions. Over 200 participants (Vets and their families) attended the Saturday Veterans' luncheon provided for our guests. T-shirts and ball caps were distributed to all tribal veterans who attended.

Our officers have had knee operations, undergone surgical procedures and endured intense bouts of skin and muscle inflammation due to Agent Orange and dioxin exposure. We have shown you new faces this year. At the Vets' meeting in mid July, we recognized the need to elect interim leadership positions to fill vacancies left by sick call. The interim commander now is Wilson Harjo who trained with the U.S. Army National Guard with LAW & TOW anti-tank weapons from 1986 to 1989. He is a Fish (Chief) Clan member. The new interim Vice-Commander is Curtis Wakolee (Dagwood), who served in the U.S. Army on active duty as a medic in Germany from 1959 to 1962. He is a Fox Clan member. Continuing in his role as treasurer, Wallace McClellan (Bud) is of the Thunder Clan, and has been active as our sole official for most of the summer. He served in the U.S. Army for nine years in a high security communication position at the height of the Cold War. The Vets are very happy to announce that we elected Reverend Thomas Morris as our chaplain, a service he has rendered for us on occasion. He is now a welcome addition to our core. Rev. Morris served in the United States Air Force from 1954 to 1958 and then in the AF Reserve for eight years.

Nancy Poodry was offered and accepted the secretary position, a part time staff position.

We took official action to reorganize the Sac and Fox Veterans' Honor Guard to include as members only veterans of military service. This includes all tribal members and the spouses of tribal members.

The Veterans' Auxiliary organization henceforth is a separate entity and is open to all who are relatives or spouses of Veterans. 

Had a great visit and was pleased by our remarks.

**LINA ORTEGA LIBRARIAN OF THE YEAR
(OU CHEMISTRY-MATHEMATICS LIBRARY)**

Tribal member Lina Ortega, Chemistry-Mathematics Librarian at the University of Oklahoma, won the Thomas and Catherine Luccock Librarian of the Year Award, presented by Sul H. Lee, Dean of the University of Oklahoma Libraries, on September 10, 2010.

Otega said she felt very honored to be recognized by her colleagues for her work.

“The Thomas & Catherine Luccock Librarian of the Year Award,” stated Dean Lee in his presentation comments, “is awarded annually to recognize and commend an individual librarian for superior performance and contributions to the University of Oklahoma Libraries...and will receive \$2,000 and a certificate of recognition. In addition, there will be a plaque, located in Bizzell Memorial Library, honoring the individual as the Thomas & Catherine Luccock Librarian of the Year.”

Lee also recognized selection committee members Fred Reiss, Starla Doescher, Stephen Rogers, Rhonda Cannon, and chair Debra Engel.

Lee’s presentation continued: “The librarian who receives this award must demonstrate excellence in librarianship, including scholarly activity, program planning, and service to the university and to the profession that serves as an exemplary model for his or her colleagues. The 2010 Thomas and Catherine Luccock Librarian of the Year Award winner is: Lina Ortega, Chemistry-Mathematics Librarian.”

“Lina began her work as branch librarian at the Chemistry-Mathematics Library and the Physics-Astronomy Library in 2001. Both of these libraries have provided Ms. Ortega with numerous opportunities and challenges during her tenure with University Libraries. The comments made by her colleagues speak to Lina’s value to our organization.”

One colleague wrote that Lina

“handled the temporary closure of the Physics-Astronomy Library with great aplomb, identifying the materials that would have to be moved to Bizzell Memorial Library and those that would be retained in the renovated Physics Library. Throughout the process, she remained in close contact with impacted faculty and students, keeping them informed and providing service to assist them during the temporary closure.”

One of her staff members comments, “Lina has created an open line of communication with students and faculty and offers workshops on library database and services. She encourages them to let her know if they are interested in particular subject disciplines or to suggest books and materials. Lina has always been open to the needs of those working with her. She is a constant teacher and mentor for me so that I keep learning and do not become stagnant in my job.”

Another colleague writes, “The commitment that Lina devotes to collection development is particularly notable; she seems always to know what new resources and trends are on the horizon in her collection development areas. Ms. Ortega’s collection development decisions are always thoughtful; they strike an appropriate balance between her faculty’s search habits and desires and the libraries’ interest in negotiating fair licensing terms and maintaining perpetual access to electronic materials.”

From a faculty member in the Physics-Astronomy Department, “During my 34 years as a faculty member here, I have had the good fortune to work with many competent, helpful members of the library faculty and staff. Lina Ortega stands out for the range and depth of her expertise, for her willingness to help with any problem, for her ability to share her knowledge, at a level pitched perfectly to the audience, with students and faculty alike.”

On August 3, 2010 the Sac and Fox Nation hosted distinguished visitors Eileen West from the Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families Children’s Bureau in Washington D.C. and Dana Huckabee and Nanette Bishop, HHS ACF Region 6 representatives from Dallas.

The visitors, accompanied by Karen Hamilton, Indian Child Welfare Director, and Tammy Arellano, Family Violence coordinator, were treated to a tour of the tribal grounds and facilities by Jellene Factor and Suzy Heck, Self Governance Director and Administrative Assistant, respectively; a welcome in Sauk from Jacob Manatowa Bailey, Sauk Language Director and one from George Thurman, Principal Chief; a tribal history presentation by Sandra Massey, Historic Preservation Officer; and lunch with the Child Protection Team, whose members represent the tribal government, police department, Juvenile Detention facility, court, and education departments.

The Sac and Fox Nation is one of seven tribes to receive a Tribal Title IV-E Plan Development Grant from the ACF.

According to its funding announcement, the ACF grant’s purpose “is to make one-time grants to Tribes, Tribal organizations, or Tribal consortia that are seeking to develop, and within 24 months of grant receipt, submit to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) a plan to implement a title IV-E foster care, adoption assistance and, at Tribal option, guardianship assistance program. Grant funds under this announcement may be used for the cost of developing a title IV-E plan under Section 471 of the Social Security Act (the Act) to carry out a program under Section 479B of the Act. The grant may be used for costs relating to the development of data collection systems, a cost allocation plan, agency and Tribal court procedures necessary to meet the case review system requirements under Section 475(5) of the Act, or any other costs attributable to meeting any other requirement necessary for approval of a title IV-E plan.”

The Sac and Fox Nation visit marked the first ever to a tribe by ACF representatives.

**1930s TO 1980s AMERICAN INDIAN ART ON
EXHIBIT AT OKC RED EARTH GALLERY**

A new exhibit at the Red Earth Museum & Gallery in downtown Oklahoma City entitled “RETROspective” features select pieces from the museum’s permanent collection that reflects upon a 50-year span of contemporary and modern American Indian art styles from the 1930s – 1980s.

“RETROspective” is a compilation of art pieces culled from the Red Earth Museum permanent collection that have rarely been seen by the public. The show, on view

deer. The glasses read “Famous Oklahoma Indians” across the top. Featured on the glasses are famous Oklahoma Indians including Bacon Rind (Osage), Dull Knife (Cheyenne), Ruling His Sun (Pawnee), Hunting Horse (Kiowa), Sequoyah (Cherokee), Geronimo (Apache), Quanah Parker (Comanche), and Hen-Toh (Wyandotte). The complete set is on loan from Oklahoma City resident Hattie Fixico who purchased her set in 1959 at the Kerr McGee Gas Station near NW 10th and

through October 31, features the artwork of prominent American Indian artists including Benjamin Harjo Jr. (Seminole-Shawnee), Acee Blue Eagle (Muscogee/Creek, Pawnee,

Wichita), Woody Crumbo (Potawatomi), Bill Flores (Cherokee, Papago), Joan Hill (Creek), Charles Pratt (Cheyenne/Arapaho) and Jean Bales (Iowa). Featured in the exhibit are 1959-era Oklahoma Indian glasses, pitcher and a wooden tray that were available free from Knox Gas Stations all over Oklahoma with the purchase of 10 gallons or more.

Hilton Hotel, hosts a diverse and changing schedule of museum exhibitions and is custodian of a permanent collection of more than 1,400 items of fine art, pottery, basketry, textiles and beadwork. The organization is recognized as the region’s premier organization for advancing the understanding and continuation of Native American traditional and contemporary culture and arts.

The Red Earth Gallery provides a year-round venue for Native American artists to sell their original works to the public. The Gallery also features Native American related items including children’s books, blankets and Red Earth memorabilia.
